

Paul Navarre will look at Christian shifts in beliefs that have caused division within Christianity in a class called "From Abraham to the ELCA." Join him in Fellowship Hall at 10:00 am the first Sunday in March as he looks at the many divisions believers in God have adopted—Christians and Jews, Protestants and Catholics, Lutherans and Calvinists, and even the different types of Lutherans.

### **Table Talk: Reparations in the Bible**

Gathered around the table in his home, Martin Luther talked freely and openly with his colleagues and students about matters of faith, theology, and varied aspects of daily life. In an effort to cultivate this kind of spirited discussion, we have a tradition at St. Andrew of **able lalk** gathering for Table Talks. Pastor Brocker invites you to participate in the next Table Talk via Zoom on Thursday, February 24, at 7:00 pm.

Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Nikole Hannah-Jones has asserted that 250 years of slavery and 100 years of legalized segregation have robbed Black Americans of the ability to accumulate wealth. She claims that cash payments-that is, reparationswould help repair the damage.

In this Table Talk, we will discuss how we as people of faith are to respond to this call for reparations. In his article "Saving the Egyptians" in The Christian Century (January 12, 2022), Matthew Schlimm makes the case that Exodus 12 tells a story of reparations for slavery. He explains that White Americans tend to view themselves as God's chosen people, but "in actuality, White Americans more closely resemble the Egyptians than the Israelites. Unlike the Egyptians, however, White people have failed to pay reparations for the legacy of slavery."

## **Recycling Tidbits**

Your St. Andrew Staff

I contacted the recycling department for Beaverton about whether yogurt containers can go into the mixed recycle curbside bin. The rules say that containers less than 6 ounces can't go in the bin. This is the response I got:

"The 5.3 ounce yogurt containers hold six fluid ounces, so they are a "yes" and can go into the mixed recycling. They are large enough not to get lost in between the pieces of paper at the sorting facility and end up at the paper mill."



I also learned this about caps and lids:

"Plastic caps and lids of any size cannot go into the mixed recycling. At the sorting facility they behave like paper and end up



baled with the paper and sent to the paper mill where they are contaminants and thus garbage.

"That said, large thick metal lids like those from a jar of spaghetti sauce can go into mixed recycling, just bend them slightly so they're easier for the magnet to pick up. Metal caps and smaller pieces of scrap metal must be contained within a metal can and crimped shut, as the smaller metal pieces get lost in the paper."

I know there have been some questions, I hope this helps!
