
Mental Illness in Our Midst: How Does It Look & How Can We Respond?

2022 National Youth Gathering Cancelled



ELCA churches around the country were notified earlier this week that the 2022 ELCA National Youth Gathering planned for Minneapolis this coming summer has been cancelled. The announcement follows:

"After much prayer, conversation and tears, we have made the difficult decision to cancel the 2022 Gathering, MYLE and the tAble due to the ongoing pandemic, the recent COVID-19 surge and public health considerations.

"We know there are thousands of young people who will not get to experience the Gathering, and our hearts break for them. This was not an easy decision, and we ask for your prayers and your grace. We understand the impact this decision will have on our youth, volunteers and planning teams, and we hope to return to Minneapolis for a future Gathering.

"With God's power at work in and through us, we can do far more than we dare ask or imagine! The ELCA is fully committed to supporting the young people of our church and to seeing that the ministry of the Gathering, MYLE and the tAble continue for years to come. With that assurance, we are turning our attention toward 2024 for the next Gathering. Stay tuned to Gathering communications for a location announcement this summer."

Horizon Team Established



What do members of our faith community envision for the future of St. Andrew? How might we evolve to support our core values? Should we be thinking about possible changes to our traditional worship patterns,

norms that have already been altered by the pandemic? What possibilities might we consider to ensure our community remains vibrant and engaged in our neighborhood and the world beyond? How can we live into God's plan for all of creation?

The Congregational Council has established a Horizon Team to be guided by Terry Moe, longtime pastor, community organizer, and author of The Bush Still Burns: How Spirituality and Organizing Transformed a Pastor and Congregation. From the congregation, Scott Anderson, Larry Bliesner, Pat Christiansen, Bobbie Larson, Barton Robison, and LuAnn Staul will form the initial corps of the Horizon Team. Next month, they will begin outlining a plan to gather information from a wide variety of individuals and groups that are invested in St. Andrew's future.

What do you hope to see down the road, maybe in three to five years? Start envisioning what could be. Over the next several months, the Horizon Team will be listening to many, many people as they gather ideas for a report and recommendations to the Congregational Council. Stay tuned for emerging details.

Table Talk: Reparations in the Bible

Thursday, February 24, 7:00-8:00 pm via Zoom



Gathered around the table in his home, Martin Luther talked freely and openly with his colleagues and students about matters of faith, theology, and varied aspects of daily life. In an effort to cultivate this kind of spirited discussion, we have a tradition at St. Andrew of gathering for Table Talks. Pastor Brocker invites you to participate in the Table Talk next Table Talk via Zoom on <u>Thursday, February 24</u>, at 7:00 pm.

Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Nikole Hannah-Jones has asserted that 250 years of slavery and 100 years of legalized segregation have robbed Black Americans of the ability to accumulate wealth. She claims that cash payments-that is, reparationswould help repair the damage.

In this Table Talk, we will discuss how we as people of faith are to respond to this call for reparations. In his article "Saving the Egyptians" in The Christian Century (January 12, 2022), Matthew Schlimm makes the case that Exodus 12 tells a story of reparations for slavery. He explains that White Americans tend to view themselves as God's chosen people, but "in actuality, White Americans more closely A CASE FOR resemble the Egyptians than the Israelites. Unlike the Egyptians, however, White people have failed to pay reparations for the legacy of slavery."



id you know that Dietrich Bonhoeffer had a twin? He and his sister Sabine were born on <u>February 4, 1906</u> in the German city of Breslau, which is now part of Poland. Dietrich and Sabine were #6 & 7 in a family of 8 children. Their father Karl was a psychiatrist and neurologist noted for his criticism of Sigmund Freud, while his mother Paula (née von Hase) was a teacher. Both Dietrich and his older brother Klaus were executed by the Nazis in 1945 for their involvement in the July 20 plot to assassinate Adolph Hitler.
