#### **Ministry Support Forum**



Clicking on the triangle will bring you to the <u>advanced search page</u> where you can further define your search using boolean parameters.

#### **Book Detail Pages**

The <u>detail page</u> will tell you if the book is found in the adult or children's library, book description, reviews, other books we have by this author, and similar books.

For now, the status of all books will show as available. Until we go to digital checkout this will not always be true. If you click on the <u>Ask About This</u>, you can send us an email requesting the book. When we receive the message, we will pull the book and set it aside with your name on it for you to pick up. Our libraries are staffed about once a week, but are always open for self checkout. Clicking on the star will allow you to make a list of books that you can email to yourself.

Of course, we still encourage you to come and browse our shelves. We will continue using the pocket cards for checkout until we work out the system for digital checkout. Pam has uploaded all the adult library fiction collection of about 500 books, and is starting on the adult nonfiction section. In the children's library, about 90%, or around 5,000 books, are searchable online. We are working on matching the records with our library's collections and call numbers. Until we finish this, you may find online records with incorrect call numbers. While this is still a work in progress, we hope that this searchable database will make it easier to find some gems just right for you. #### Aiming for a Sustainable Wardrobe

Last week's quiz about the clothes we wear and the industries that support them revealed some surprising facts about the impact that fast fashion has on our world:

- <u>Garment manufacturing is the second biggest contributor to</u> <u>modern slavery</u>.
- <u>Textiles produce 35 percent of the micro-plastic pollution in the world's oceans.</u>
- <u>Textile manufacturing uses 20 percent of the world's clean</u> <u>water each year</u>.

So, what can we do? First of all, recognize that the most sustainable wardrobe is the one you have now and make the most of it. Some people pledge not to buy any new clothing for a month or a year. They commit to a sort of fashion fast. If you're not ready to go that far, you can still take steps to make a positive difference:



- Examine the clothing you own.
- Keep what you love to wear.
- Get rid of what you're not going to wear again:
  - 1. Give it to a friend.
    - 2. Donate it to a thrift store.
    - 3. Upcycle it with some embroidery or clever patching.
    - 4. Cut it up and make it into something else, such as a tote, a dust rag, a dog bed, a table runner, a glasses case.
- When you need something new to you, check out lightly used clothing available at thrift stores and even online.
- Whether buying new or used, purchase well-constructed clothing made with natural fibers that you could wear for years (perhaps even decades).



## Wash your clothes in cold water

Try washing your clothes in cold water – this is an easy way to save energy and prevent carbon pollution. Hot water heating accounts for about 90 percent of the energy your machine uses to wash clothes – only 10 percent goes to electricity used by the washer motor. • Wash your clothes in cold water and only when necessary to reduce the amount of microfibers that get swept into our water-sheds.

• Dry clothes on the line when it's possible; start them in a dryer for some softness and then move them to a clothesline for that fresh-air smell.

- Learn to mend; visible mending is becoming a rage around the world.
- Support clothing makers who have begun to change their practices to become more sustainable. Levi's will pay you for your used jeans. Patagonia has set a goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2025 and publishes a sustainability report where it shares the number of garments it repairs each year (101,706 in 2020) and the amount of plastic waste it keeps out of the ocean (the company turned fishing nets into gear to keep 527 tons of plastic waste from polluting the world's oceans).

By becoming aware that even our clothing affects the environment, we can make decisions that are better for the planet.
