As we prepare to begin the new program year on September 11, we are in need of volunteers to staff the nursery and the pre-K classroom for our children's ministry. As always, the more people we have sign up to help, the smaller everyone's individual commitment. If you are willing to take your turn with our little ones, here is what we are looking for:



**For the Nursery:** We are currently reviewing applications for a Sunday Nursery Attendant, and hope to have someone hired and ready to start with the new program year. Yet, our safe child policy (and the number of babies we have in our congregation) requires two adults to be present with our kids. We need adults to take their turn assisting the

Nursery Attendant during each worship service and during the education hour.

**For Pre-K:** Our Pre-K class is our education-hour class for kids from 3 years old until they are entering Kindergarten. The class will be mostly free-play, with an emphasis on building relationships between the kids and the teachers. We want them to know that church is safe and fun! There will also be a very short story time, reading the week's Bible story from a children's Bible. Again, we need two adults for this class each Sunday, so the more helpers we get, the better!

Dear St. Andrew Lutheran Church,

Thank you for your recent gift to Lutheran World Relief. I'd like to share a story with you about how your support makes a real difference.

Rajendra Kushwaha and his wife Nikky Devi used to have a hard time sleeping, as they feared they'd be woken in the night by rising floodwaters that would wash away their home, gardens, and livestock. It had happened several times before—the river near their home in India would swell without warning and sweep everything away, leaving their family vulnerable to hunger.

But your kindness reached them on the banks of the river. For them, your love sounds like an announcement made through a tinny megaphone, letting them know a flood is coming. This early warning system urges their entire village to take their livestock and valuables to higher ground well before the floodwaters arrive. Your love is also teaching them new farming techniques—like growing food on rooftops or in hanging baskets—so their vital crops don't wash away. Now Rajendra and his family can rest easier at night, knowing their crops and futures are more secure.

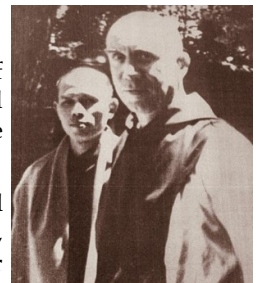
## Retreat on Engaged Spirituality

Part of the challenge for us is to discern what are the most faithful and effective ways to resist Christian Nationalism. We need to be very aware of the context in which we are resisting. ## Climate Corner: Home Heating & Cooling

Americans are above average in terms of the carbon footprint we leave, with each of us generating 18.55 tons of CO<sub>2</sub> emissions per year, or 3.5 times the global average. Our homes are exceptional too, but not in a way that's good for the planet.

The average American single-family home built in 2019 was 2,584 square feet. Second only to Australia, the U.S. has the largest houses in the world. You could fit more than 11 Chinese homes into the average American house! That comes with a high environmental price, increases transportation emissions through long commutes, and encourages the accumulation of lots of stuff. And it takes a lot of energy to heat and cool those big homes. Home heating and cooling comprise 17% of Americans' carbon footprint. For most Americans, home heating and cooling is the third largest source of their CO<sub>2</sub> emissions. Here are some tips to improve your heating and cooling footprint.

**Good:** A good place to start is by looking at your habits. Do you set your air conditioner (AC) to a lower temperature in summer than you set your heater in winter? Do you turn on the heater on the first chilly day? Or do you wait until you actually feel cold? Try dressing for the season and setting your thermostat as close to the outside temperature as is comfortable. Put on a sweater and turn down the heat 5 degrees while you are home. Or put on shorts in the summer and turn up the AC 5 degrees. Turn the heat down or the AC up 10 degrees while you are away from home to reduce your heating or cooling load by up to 10%. Put the heat/AC on vacation mode or adjust by 20 to 30 degrees when leaving for days. Installing a smart thermostat can help you save energy too.

Tap into energy efficiency programs through PGE. Keeping on top of home maintenance tasks like duct cleaning, servicing your

furnace and AC, and sealing windows and doors will improve home energy efficiency. Even your choice of window treatments can make a difference in both cold weather and to combat the heat island effect in hot weather. (More about heat islands next week.)

**Better:** Sealing air leaks will make your home perform better, saving 15% to 25% of the heat your furnace generates in winter and blocking the same amount of unwanted heat gain in summer. For most homes insulating floors, walls, and ceilings can cut this leakage by about a third. Doors and windows are popular upgrades, which at a combined one-fifth of leakage are not insignificant. But ducts and fireplaces are still bigger leakage culprits.

Reduce your heating and cooling energy consumption by sealing leaks in your home. When upgrading your older furnace, choose a highly efficient model and consider the source of your electricity when you decide between gas and electric. Consider just using fans which use a fraction of the energy of AC. They also do not require chemical coolants, which are greenhouse gases. If you really need air conditioning, ask yourself whether you can get by with a window unit, which uses a third as much energy as central air conditioning. Whatever AC you end up buying, choose the most efficient model. Consider installing a heat pump which emits about 1/4 the amount of carbon as AC and furnaces.

**Best:** The smaller your square footage, the less energy will be needed for heating and cooling. If you plan to move, look for a smaller home. Or consider dividing your home into a duplex. Or take in a renter so the heating/cooling energy is shared with more folks. Whatever your square footage, if you're building a home, use passive design and other green building strategies like earth-sheltered construction to achieve net-zero energy use.

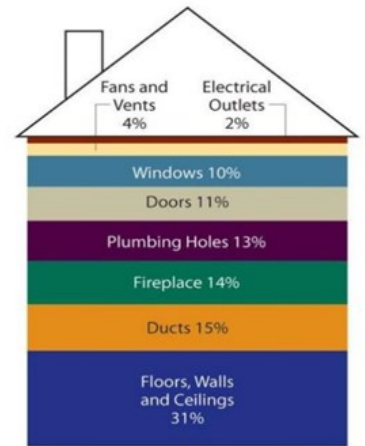
