With the generous giving by the people of St. Andrew, we will be able to provide 50 families with \$50 gift cards for Thanksgiving and more than \$2,250 to the St. Matthew food bank.

Earlier this month, Jamie Lyons from the Washington County Community Action Healthy Families program visited the Service Committee

to talk about her organization's work in the community. This program supports more than 50 families across Washington County with trained Family Visitors. The Family Visitors meet families with infants from birth to 3 years to help with goal planning, housing, mental health issues, health screening, and parenting skills. The program has demonstrated long-term outcomes which have resulted in improved physical and mental health, stable employment, and housing for the participants.

Jamie relayed a story about a mom who receive a Thanksgiving Gift Card last year. This mom had a blended family of 4 children under 8 years old, one being a baby. Although the dad worked full-time, the family was on the cusp financially. They had experienced multiple episodes of COVID, with the children missing school and therefore missing free meals. This family was very grateful for the gift card, without which a Thanksgiving meal would not have been possible.

Thank you all for making Thanksgiving possible for so many in need.

Thank You for Welcoming Refugees

Thank you, St. Andrew people, for your quick response in helping to meet the needs of the family we have been assisting through Lutheran Community Services Northwest (LCSNW). The only items remaining on their list of needs are <u>blankets and</u> <u>linens</u>. The family has one queen bed, three twins for their little girls, and a crib for their two-year-old son.

Nasir & Amina Malik Zada and their four young children—all under the age of 7—are from Afghanistan, where Nasir (age 31) worked at Bagram Air Base and Amina (age 28) was a geography teacher. Their native language is Dari and their English is limited, but they're both learning.

The family has now resided in the US for more than 90 days and so is being transferred to another program within LCSNW, the Afghan Response Program. As a result, the rent subsidy they have been receiving will be decreasing. If you wish to make a financial donation to the family, please make your check payable to St. Andrew and indicate Sanctuary/Refugee Family on the memo line.

Our neighbor congregation, St. Matthew Lutheran Church, has a Cars for Success program that provides used cars in good condition to low-income people who are employed and would benefit from having a car to travel to work and attend to the needs of their children.

A car can be donated whether it's running or not and will then be evaluated at a car shop. Donated vehicles go to one of three places: after any needed repairs, they're donated to an eligible family; they're sold by Cars for Success to support the repair of other cars; or, if they are too expensive to repair, they're sold at an insurance auction. A car recipient never knows who has donated the vehicle.

Stock Transfer Donation Process for Tax Year 2022

Greetings from the Financial Secretaries of St. Andrew. As the end of the calendar year approaches, we want to inform you of the process for donating stock to the church.

Contributions must actually be paid before the close of the year to be deductible in 2022. Therefore, please allow at least 3 weeks or more for the completion of the transfer. **Please start the process as soon as possible.**

We ask you to take the necessary steps if you intend to donate stock to St. Andrew this tax year:

- 1. Download the Stock Transfer Form found on our church website or contact the church office.
- Contact your brokerage firm to initiate an electronic transfer of securities (see form for instructions/details). PLEASE NOTE: <u>We cannot do this for you.</u>
- **3.** Complete the form including your intentions for the use of the donation and email a copy to <u>tammychef15@gmail.com</u>. You may instead send a copy to the church office marked *confidential for Financial Secretaries*. <u>This form must be turned in at the beginning of the process. Without this form, we cannot complete your request.</u>
- 4. Upon receipt of the form, Tammy Piscitelli will be in contact with you regarding the progress of the electronic stock transfer to the church's securities firm, Charles Schwab.

CLIMATE CORNER: Buy Nothing Day

Originating in Vancouver, Canada in the early 90's, National Buy Nothing Day occurs on the day after Thanksgiving each year in the US. In an effort to combat the unethical mob shopping behaviors of Black Friday, artist Ted Dave established this anticonsumerism holiday. The idea is to counteract the madness of holiday shopping by encouraging a mindful and environmentally friendly attitude toward post-feast purchasing.

History of Buy Nothing Day: This day is sort of an anti-holiday in that it found its legs in response to a preexisting celebration: Black Friday. Black Friday earned its name from retailers who, after spending the year "in the red," operating at a loss or breaking even, would skyrocket sales into the "black," or a state of positive income after Thanksgiving. This shopping rush traditionally occurs on the day after Thanksgiving as many stores advertise unmissable sales to draw early Christmas-gift shoppers to the market.

As Black Friday became embedded in American culture, Ted Dave found the drastic shift from a day meant for gratitude to a day meant for chaos and greed to be quite off-putting. As a result, he established National Buy Nothing Day in 1992 to counteract the madness of the nation's materialistic behavior.

Today Americans practice National Buy Nothing Day in an effort to mediate the exorbitant amounts of waste and auxiliary spending that can often occur in the weeks surrounding Thanksgiving and Christmas. The idea is that after spending on food, décor, travel and lodging for Thanksgiving, the nation should go on a spending detox by enjoying the day at home with family or in nature.

How to Celebrate National Buy Nothing Day:

Indulge in a Christmas movie marathon. Sleep in, stay in your jammies, and gather together in the living room to watch Christmas movies on Hallmark and eat leftovers. Enjoy each other's company!

- Make a donation. Instead of purchasing something for your own use, sift through your belongings to find something you could donate to Goodwill or the Salvation Army. In a season of generosity, so many go without.
- Make home-made gifts to give. Use your cooking/baking, carpentry, or sewing skills to make Christmas gifts or Christmas ornaments.
- Bake Christmas cookies.
- Go outside. Go for a hike. Go watch waterfalls. Go for a bike ride. Plant a tree.
- Cozy up with a good book in your jammies. Read to the kids.
- Work a puzzle as a family, play games.

Reasons to Love National Buy Nothing Day:

- Save money. Not only will we refrain from purchasing unneeded items simply because they are on sale, but we'll also save on gas and eating out, especially when you already have all those yummy left-overs at home to eat. It's a winwin!
- Pausing before purchasing strengthens our mindfulness.

Those of us who are fortunate enough to have auxiliary funds can sometimes fall into the trap of keeping up with the Joneses by making purchases without much forethought. On this day each year we have the opportunity to pause and condense our holiday shopping lists to only the items that will truly be appreciated and make an impact.

It relieves the pressure. Sometimes the mere fact that an item is on sale can feel like an obligation to purchase. That's the whole idea behind Black Friday: To entice us into spending.
