
Welcome Sunday!

Stock Transfer Donation Process for Tax Year 2022

Greetings from the Financial Secretaries of St. Andrew. As the end of the calendar year approaches, we want to inform you of the process for donating stock to the church.

Contributions must actually be paid before the close of the year to be deductible in 2022. Therefore, please allow at least 3 weeks or more for the completion of the transfer. **Please start the process as soon as possible.**

We ask you to take the necessary steps if you intend to donate stock to St. Andrew this tax year:

- 1. Download the Stock Transfer Form found on our church website or contact the church office.
- 2. Contact your brokerage firm to initiate an electronic transfer of securities (see form for instructions/details). PLEASE NOTE: We cannot do this for you.
- 3. Complete the form including your intentions for the use of the donation and email a copy to tammychef15@gmail.com. You may instead send a copy to the church office marked *confidential for Financial Secretaries*. This form must be turned in at the beginning of the process. Without this form, we cannot complete your request.
- Upon receipt of the form, Tammy Piscitelli will be in contact with you regarding the progress of the electronic stock transfer to the church's securities firm, Charles Schwab.

CLIMATE CORNER:

Aquamation for a Greener Afterlife

Death is just one point on the circle of life and dying sustainably takes just as much mindful planning as living sustainably does. Most people avoid thinking about death, but modern death care practices make funerals a tradition



with some rather deadly environmental impacts. Fortunately, more sustainable options like aquamation are becoming easier to access, so environmentalists can rest a little easier now about how sustainably they are going to rest in peace later.

Conventional Death Care: In most places, regulations for death care don't leave a lot of room for the environment. Humans are no longer allowed to decompose six feet underground in a natural pine box. Modern burial requires the use of toxic, persistent chemicals for embalming. Caskets use the wood from four million square acres of forest each year. More than 1.5 million tons of concrete are used to construct burial vaults, while 104,000 tons of steel and 2,700 tons of copper and bronze are used in burial materials. All told, burials result in 178 tons of carbon dioxide emissions yearly. About 827,000 gallons of formaldehyde-based embalming fluid leak into the soil and groundwater annually.

Cremation is better for the environment. Bodies are typically stored in cardboard rather than wooden caskets before burning. In the U.S., crematoriums are required to use filtering systems that remove pollutants such as the mercury in dental fillings. But burning still uses a lot of energy. Crematoria are usually powered by nonrenewable natural gas, a greenhouse gas. Although better than a traditional burial, each cremation still produces as much CO_2 as a flight from London to Rome, for a total of about 360,000 metric tons of CO_2 emissions each year.

There are some eco-friendly options for natural burials. A few states have even begun to allow human composting. Washington was the first to legalize it followed by Colorado, then Oregon. California may be next.

Aquamation: Initially developed in an agricultural context in the late 20th century for disposing of deceased farm animals, aquamation was then used by research institutions for human remains that had been donated to science. Aquamation has been commercially available in several states since 2011, including Washington and Oregon. But it has only recently received public attention after the body of Archbishop Desmond Tutu was aquamated early in 2022. Aquamation, like composting or cremation, is a method of rapid decomposition. Both methods use heat; composting uses the heat naturally generated by decomposition, while cremation uses powerful furnaces. But aquamation, as the name suggests, takes place in a liquid solution.

Sometimes described as "water cremation," aquamation is a chemical process called alkaline hydrolysis, which dissolves the body. Although chemical dissolution sounds more horrifying than ecological, it's no more gruesome than burning. The body is placed in a container with a liquid solution made of potassium hydroxide (aka lye) and water and heated to 300° F, a fraction of the 1,200° F required for cremation.

What Remains of the Remains? The chemical reaction leaves behind only bone fragments and liquid. The resulting liquid is a sterile combination of salts, sugars, amino acids, and peptides in water, with no residual tissues or DNA. This liquid can be safely discharged with wastewater. The remaining bone fragments can be heat dried or allowed to dry naturally to save energy. Then they are pulverized using the same method that follows heat cremation. Families can claim these "ashes" just as they can for cremains. Aquamation "ashes" will require a larger container than ashes from cremation, but will have a finer, brighter white appearance. All told, aquamation is estimated to have ¼ the carbon footprint of cremation. Aquamation is often considered a gentler process because medical devices like pacemakers (which can explode inside a furnace) do not have to be removed from the body before aquamation.

Aquamation Options: Aquamation is legal in most states, including Washington and Oregon. It is defined as a form of cremation and most providers are crematoria. Contact the Cremation Association of North America for more details. Where aquamation is available, costs average around \$3,500, placing it between the lower costs of cremation and the higher costs of burial.

A car can be donated whether it's running or not and will then be evaluated at a car shop. Donated vehicles go to one of three places: after any needed repairs, they're donated to an eligible family; they're sold by Cars for Success to

support the repair of other cars; or, if they are too expensive to repair, they're sold at an insurance auction. A car recipient never knows who has donated the vehicle.
