Midway through our single-service trial, the Council continues to check the vibes from the congregation. How do you feel about having one service on Sunday mornings?



Lenten Food Train Begins Its Journey

The engine is revved up and getting ready to haul boxcars of food and hygiene products destined for the St. Matthew food



bank. St. Andrew people donate food all year long for this ministry, but the Service Committee traditionally makes food collection its focus during Lent.

The train has begun in the Narthex and as we add boxcars, it will wind its way around the church. Please bring your non-perishable food items (e.g., spaghetti sauce, canned corn, sugar, rice, beans), as well as hygiene products (shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant) to fill the boxcars.

If you prefer to donate money instead, you may write a check payable to St. Andrew with Lenten Food Drive on the memo line. Or go online and select Lenten Food Drive to donate. A new boxcar will be added with every \$250 added to the fund.

This is a very critical time for those in need in our community. Not only has inflation impacted the ability for people to purchase food, but February was the last month that the federal government allowed Oregon to issue pandemic emergency food benefits. Your donations will make a big difference!





Answers to Sustainable Fashion Quiz

- 1. C. The fashion industry is responsible for 8-10% of global greenhouse gas emissions. If it does not accelerate its response to climate change, the industry will produce twice the volume of emissions required to align with Paris Agreement global warming targets by 2030.
- D. The fashion industry contributes to all of the above. Deforestation occurs when land is cleared for grazing animals that produce leather, wool, and other animal products. Deforestation and overgrazing can cause desertification and soil degradation. With this habitat loss and pollution from production, the fashion industry causes a loss of biodiversity.
- D. It takes 999 gallons of water to make one pair of jeans, from the production of the cotton to the delivery of the finished garment to a store. Textile manufacturing uses 20% of the world's clean water each year.
- D. Less than 1% of clothing is recycled. The repurposing or reselling of textiles is often incorrectly referred to as recycling. They are actually recycled or reused by being broken down and made into new products, often insulation or stuffing materials.
- B. Greenwashing refers to claims of environmental sustainability by a brand that are false or misleading. The International Consumer Protection and Enforcement Network (ICPEN), a global network of consumer protection authorities, recently swept websites for greenwashing. They found that as many as 40% of environmental claims could be misleading customers.
- A. Polyester, along with other synthetic fabrics, releases microplastics when washed. It is estimated that textiles produce 35% of the microplastic pollution in the oceans worldwide, which totals more than 20 million tons of microfibers that enter the oceans each year.
- D. All are correct statistics about garment factory workers. The 2018 Global Slavery Index found that garment manufacturing was the 2nd biggest contributor to modern slavery, the first being the production of technology. In order to keep fast fashion cheap for Western consumption, Bangladeshi garment factory workers earn a low wage of approximately \$95 per month, far lower than a living wage. Many workers are also victims of forced labor, estimated by the International Labor Organization to be 170 million children.
- 8. C. According to a study of 2,000 women by the UK charity Barnardo's, a garment is worn only 7 times on average before it is discarded. In the past 15 years, clothing utilization has decreased by 36%, creating more pollution and waste.
- 9. A. Buying new clothing to match seasonal trends is not an example of shopping sustainably. Shopping at thrift stores, buying few high-quality items, and picking garments made from natural fibers are all examples of ways to shop for clothing in a sustainable way.
- 10. D. All are good alternatives to throwing out unwanted clothing. Just because a piece is no longer your size or style doesn't mean it won't be someone else's, and there are so many ways to upcycle your old clothes into something new!

Honoring Women Composers

March is National Women's History Month, a celebration of women's contributions to history, culture, and society. To honor women composers, the American Guild of Organists and the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians have asked church musicians to play music by women composers for service on Sunday, March 5. Three women composers are represented this Sunday:

Our liturgy during Lent is Setting 12 from *All Creation Sings* and was written by Anne Krentz Organ. A composer and church musician serving as the Director of Music Ministries at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Park Ridge, IL, Anne is the primary composer of Setting 12.

The prelude this Sunday was written by Elizabeth Turner. Although little is known about English composer and singer Elizabeth Turner (1700-1756), her songs were quite popular in the first half of the 18th century and critics revered her as a first-rate soprano. She is also one of the first known Englishwomen to publish a substantial collection of musical works.

Sunday's postlude was written by Luise Adopha Le Beau (1850-1927). A German composer of classical music, she studied with Clara Schumann, Franz Lachner, and Josef Gabriel Rheinverger. Like many 19th century female composers, Le Beau began her career in music as a pianist and later earned her living teaching, critiquing, and performing music.

This year's Synod Assembly, scheduled for <u>Saturday</u>, <u>May 20</u>, will be online.

Made up of voting members from all synod congregations, the Synod Assembly is the governing body of the Oregon Synod. Through a democratic voting process the Synod Assembly establishes synod ministry priorities, approves the synod budget, and elects members to synod positions. This annual gathering of clergy and lay people represents the synod's highest legislative authority.
