

With the help of Carol Harker, we have completed a structural and property inventory, assessed our financial situation, and reviewed our stewardship resources as part of our study of the congregation.

Over the next few months, we will be planning opportunities for the congregation to provide input on St. Andrew's vision for the future, changes or trends within the congregation which have occurred in the last three to five years, and ways that the community has been challenged by change and transition.

Recycle+—What Is It?

Thanks to all who attended the Earth Care Fair on April 23! One thing that I became aware of is that most people do not seem to know about Washington County's Recycle+ option for recycling difficult to recycle items, which is what prompted me to write this article.

Recycle+ is an optional and convenient service available to residential customers living in urban unincorporated Washington County. It is available to single family homes through four-plexes in Washington County, as well as in the cities of King City, Durham, Beaverton, Sherwood, and North Plains. Recycle+ became available in Tigard on May 1, 2023, and will be available to apartment dwellers this summer! This optional service is avail-



able from your garbage and recycling company. Contact your garbage hauler to see if Recycle+ is available for your address.

Materials accepted in the Recycle+ collection service:

- Stretchy plastic film and bags such as plastic bags, produce bags, dry cleaning bags, plastic padded envelopes (no padded manila or paper envelopes), and plastic over wrap for paper towels, paper plates, napkins, etc.
- Clear plastic #1 clamshell containers such as egg cartons, fruit containers, bakery containers, and take-out containers. No colored clamshells, just the clear ones.
- Textiles such as bed linens, clothing, towels, clean rags, and sewing scraps.
- Compact fluorescent light bulbs. The long fluorescent tubes used in commercial lighting are **not** accepted. Bulbs must be contained in a zip-sealed bag.

Get started! Recycle+ is an on-call service. You will pay a monthly base fee of \$2.50 and a \$9.25 pickup fee per collection. Tip: You can share service and split the cost of pickups with family, friends, or neighbors.

- Contact your garbage and recycling company to sign up. Contact info is listed below.
- Sort and bag material by type. You will receive a purple bin and bags prior to your first collection day.
- Schedule a pickup. Contact your garbage and recycling company at least 2 business days before your collection day.
- Set your bin at the curb. Have your bin out by 6:00 a.m. on your collection day. All bagged materials must fit inside the bin with the lid on.

How to find your garbage and recycling company: Use the "Garbage and Recycling Day" tool on the Washington Co. website to find your hauler if you don't know who it is.

Where does it go?



 Stretchy plastic bags and film are shipped to a company that uses the material to manufacture outdoor products such as composite decking like TREX, playground equipment, and benches.

 Clear plastic #1 clamshells are delivered to a recycling processing facility and are recycled into new PET plastic packaging.

- Textiles are sent to Pioneer Wiping Cloth, a local company that recycles textiles into wiping cloths and rags.
- Compact fluorescent lightbulbs are sent to processors who are vetted and have received third party certification through RIOS (Recycling Industry Operating Standard) and/or other e-stewards.
