Transition Team Work Continues



You may be wondering about the work of the Transition Team and how it relates to the Horizon Team and the upcoming Call process. Horizon Team work focused on listening and discernment, much of that work providing a foundation for the Transition Team. The work of the Transition Team is preparation; the work of the Call Team will be search and discernment.

During our preparation, we are following the Synod-provided detailed resource for <u>Congregations in Transition</u>; it outlines the work required during the Transition in preparation for the completion of the Mission Profile, which must be submitted before the Synod puts forward candidates.

The Mission Profile is a 10-page document that describes our congregational ministry and mission, and what characteristics we are looking for in a Lead Pastor. Over the past three months, the Transition Team has been setting the groundwork for completion of the Mission Profile. The input of the congregation is instrumental in completing this document. In July and August, we will be asking for your insight as we describe our Ministry Site Characteristics. Look for the yellow poster in the Narthex. It has statements that could describe our congregation. We ask you to use a sticky dot to select the ONE term you believe best describes St. Andrew. (That's one dot per person per row!) July's poster will feature statements about our Community and Leadership; in August we will consider our Programming and Theological Perspective.

Links to these documents are embedded in the article.

Please let any of the team members know what questions or concerns you have as we move forward.

Earth care has long been one of St. Andrew's core care values. Unusually Our church building has solar panels on its roof and the congregation has long embraced the practice of reducing, reusing, repurposing, and recycling to reduce consumption and waste.

This year already, our Earth Care Team has sponsored an Earth Care Fair, Backyard Habitat Tours, and Mindful Walks. Earth Camp brought 44 campers and their families to our campus this past week and we continue to advocate for bee-friendly habitats and ecosystems that allow all of God's creation to flourish.

Has awareness or involvement with St. Andrew's Earth-friendly focus changed your behaviors? Let's share with one another.

You've Met the Match!

Between May 17 and June 19, the people of St. Andrew contributed \$39,995 to the M&M Matching Gift Fund—more than enough to meet the goal of \$30,000 suggested by an anonymous donor! You are amazing. Given a target to hit, you stepped up and made it happen, going above and beyond what was expected. THANK YOU!

What does this mean for the church? The M&M Fund is the operating budget of St. Andrew, which covers everything from benevolence to staffing, maintenance, utilities, worship, youth programs, office supplies, and more. It keeps the lights on, the pastor paid, the garbage picked up, and our Internet running to connect us with remote worshipers and allow for hybrid meetings—and more. Because of the M&M Fund, St. Andrew can create programs such as Earth Camp, learning opportunities that not only serve our own youth, but also kids in our community.



Another Chance to Make School Bags

Every fall, we collect items to put in school bags for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). To be ready to have available bags, we need to start soon. We will meet in Fellowship Hall on <u>Monday</u>, <u>July 10</u>, at 9:30 am (latecomers welcome). We have 7 bags to start the count and we can consider how many more we can create. Will it be 100 or 400 or somewhere in between?

First, we want to assess how much we need to collect in supplies to fill the bags. While we do have material and cord for stringing some bags, we don't have enough if we're eager to make lots of bags. Note: Even if you aren't working on bag construction, you can be on the lookout for attractive, sturdy fabric and bring it to church. Donations of sturdy cloth are much appreciated!

A CARES Act Tax Advantage

This past November, a savvy member of the congregation alerted Council that St. Andrew may be able to take advantage of the Employee Retention Credit, or ERC. This tax credit, passed as part of the CARES Act during the onset of COVID, rewarded businesses for keeping people employed during the pandemic by refunding employee taxes for as long as the state's public health mandates affected business. In Oregon, where we were able to keep our staff employed for a full 18 months, St. Andrew qualified for all five quarters of available refunds.

Council hired a CPA in December to look into the credit opportunity and prepare filings for us, and we mailed in the prepared ERC forms in December 2022. We did not announce anything publicly because we wanted the IRS to verify our eligibility—but as of this week, our quarterly refund checks have begun showing up. Over the course of the coming weeks, we anticipate receiving five checks that add up to a total of just over \$135,000.

This is a momentous occasion for celebration! And extra special thanks to the congregant-who-asked-not-to-be-named for alerting Council to this opportunity. Our financial future is looking bright!


Preventing Product Returns from Going to the Landfill



Online shopping has become the way of the world. It's easy and convenient. But when you can't try on an item, or feel and examine it before buying, it may not be a keeper. Many retailers today make it easy to return items and you get your money back. But what happens to the products when you return them to the retailer?

The reality of product returns. We like to think that those returned items go back on the shelves for other customers to buy. But that is often not the case. Frequently retailers throw away that perfectly good merchandise; it is estimated that 9.5 billion pounds of returns ended up in US landfills in 2022 alone! Staff need to inspect and test every returned product before reselling it, so it can be easier and cheaper to send it to the landfill. Some companies will send some items to liquidation warehouses, but most gets tossed.

What you can do. While you probably won't know the fate of the items you return, there are a few things you can do to help minimize the waste of product returns.







Think before buying to limit the number of returns you send back. Consider giving items away instead of relegating them to a landfill.

- Instead of returning an item right away, consider gifting, donating, repurposing, or reselling it through sources such as Facebook Marketplace or eBay.
- Support companies that have responsible practices for returns. You may be able to find this information through a web search or by checking the company website.

Transportation Assistance Needed



Assistance is needed to help transport new immigrants to and from an Afghan Women's Event on July 9. The event, sponsored by Lutheran Community Services Northwest

(LCSNW), will be held here at St. Andrew on <u>Sunday, July 9</u>, from 11:00 a.m.- 5:00 p.m. in the Children's Commons. LCSNW used the Commons in April to help women and their children celebrate the conclusion of Ramadan; pleased with the accommodations, LCSNW has asked to use the area again.

The women are part of an Afghan Women's Support Group, coordinated by Amena Qadami of LCSNW. The group, which meets weekly via Zoom, is gradually returning to in-person gatherings following the pandemic, but transportation continues to be a barrier. Rarely allowed to drive in Afghanistan, immigrant women often remain house-bound here in the U.S., caring for children while their spouse works outside the home. In Afghan culture, a driver's license is seen as an empowerment tool, and the Sanctuary Team is working with LCSNW, the St. Andrew Foundation, and a local driving school to help Afghan women gain access to driver education training and an Oregon license.

Worship Leaders Volunteer Signup

Why this change?

- All the names of worship volunteers will be available in one location. This will help with preparing the list of Worship Participants in the Worship Folder.
- Two days prior to the service, an email reminder will be sent to remind those who signed up of their role.

What hasn't changed?

- Acolytes, Assisting Ministers, Cantors, and Lectors will continue to use SIGNUP.COM as they currently do and they are familiar with the software. They may find it easier to use as all the signups for a Sunday will be listed under that day. If you are interested in signing up for more than one worship volunteer activity on a particular Sunday or you don't want to overbook yourself, it will be easier to manage.
- Greeters, Nursery Volunteers, and Ushers will still have a personal touch. The schedules for Greeters will be prepared by Sharon Fako, the Nursery Volunteers by Sonja Ackman, and the Ushers by the McDowalls and Lanes. Those schedules will be entered into SIGNUP.COM by the new Worship Leader Scheduling Coordinator, Janet Vorvick.
- The Audio and Video Techs will continue to use their spreadsheet, which Janet will monitor and re-enter on SIGNUP.COM.
- Altar Guild can sign up via the lists in the Sacristy and Deacon Susan will add them to SIGNUP.COM.
- Altar Flower sign-up sheets are still available on the bulletin board near the entrance to Fellowship Hall and that information will be entered into SIGNUP.COM.

What's New?

• We are reinstating the Worship Coordinator role for Sunday services. Worship Coordinators will be responsible for ensuring that the worship leaders who have signed up are present. If a leadership role needs someone, they will look for volunteers prior to the start of the service. More information on the Worship Coordinator role is available from Deacon Susan or Beth Johnson. This role resumes as of the July 2 Sunday service, and volunteers interested in serving will be signing up via SIGN-UP.COM.
