India Jensen Kerr and Service

The congregation is invited to participate in the Ordination of India Jensen Kerr as Minister of Word and Service on Sunday, June 25, 2023, at 4:00 pm.

diakonia: Stephen, Philip, and five others oversee the distribution of food within the church in Jerusalem; Phoebe and Priscilla are identified with diakonia in Paul's letters.

Although this ministry has taken different forms throughout the church's history, its emphasis has been this: Those called to the ministry of word and service speak God's word to God's world, and in turn they speak also for the needs of God's world to the church; they give leadership in the church's mission to witness to God's love through words and actions.

Come, celebrate with India as she reaches this important milestone in her life of ministry. A reception will follow in Fellowship Hall immediately after the service.

Earth Camp!

The St. Andrew campus – both inside and out – will be hopping with creative energy next week as we welcome 44 young people for Earth Camp. The program for youngsters entering first through sixth grades runs from 9:00 am-3:00 pm with lots of classes, activities, snacks, games, songs, and skits.



It takes many, many willing volunteers to make this program possible for children in our area. From the teachers who spend hours creating lesson plans to snack makers, kid wranglers, organizers, crafters, song leaders, and more, Earth Camp happens because more than three dozen people volunteer. You've Met the Match!



Hats off to everyone who stepped up over the past few weeks to meet the challenge proposed by a generous donor! By offering to match all gifts up to \$30,000, this anonymous giver prompted many in the congregation to contribute a little bit extra to St.

Andrew's Ministry & Mission (M&M) Fund. The M&M Fund is the operating budget of the church, which covers everything from benevolence to maintenance, staffing, utilities, worship, youth programs, and more. It keeps the lights on, the pastor paid, the garbage picked up, and our Internet running to connect us to remote worshipers and allow for hybrid meetings - and more. So, THANK YOU, one and all!

A CARES Act Tax Advantage

This past November, a savvy member of the congregation alerted Council that St. Andrew may be able to take advantage of the Employee Retention Credit, or ERC. This tax credit, passed as part of the CARES Act during the onset of COVID, rewarded businesses for keeping people employed during the pandemic by refunding employee taxes for as long as the state's public health mandates affected business. In Oregon, where we were able to keep our staff employed for a full 18 months, St. Andrew qualified for all five quarters of available refunds.

Council hired a CPA in December to look into the credit opportunity and prepare filings for us, and we mailed in the prepared ERC forms in December 2022. We did not announce anything publicly because we wanted the IRS to verify our eligibility – but as of this week, our quarterly refund checks have begun showing up. Over the course of the coming weeks, we anticipate receiving five checks that add up to a total of just over \$135,000.

This is a momentous occasion for celebration! And extra special thanks to the congregant-who-asked-not-to-be-named for alerting Council to this opportunity. Our financial future is looking bright!

Verify Your Giving

The end of St. Andrew's fiscal year is approaching and that means that volunteers and staff who work on the Finance Team are busy ensuring that the church's financial records are accurate. Please log into your personal account in Fellowship One Go, go to the "Giving" tab, click on "Ways to Give" or "Click to give." The next screen asks you to log in with your username and password. Once you've taken that step, please select the "History" option to see a list of your giving by year.

On that list, you'll note that each of your contributions is directed to a fund, such as Ministry & Mission, PIPE, or Mortgage. Please verify that your gifts for this fiscal year (July 2022-Present) have been directed as you requested. It is very difficult to make changes after the year closes. Please check your giving now and contact the church office if you see anything amiss.


St. Andrew's MACG Core Team invites you to explore this question with friends new and old: What have you experienced this summer that you would like to bring back to St Andrew?

Where Does Amazon Plastic Packaging Really Go?

by Faye Park, President of PIRG (Public Interest Research Group) Amazon claims that much of its packaging is widely recyclable, either through curbside recycling programs or store drop-off. But is it actually as recyclable as the retail giant claims? A group of PIRG volunteers decided to investigate. They found that the Amazon packaging they tried to recycle did not really get recycled.

When you receive an Amazon package in the mail, it often arrives in a cardboard box filled with plastic air pillows or in a paper or plastic bubble wrap envelope. All of these items are marked with the "chasing arrows" recycling symbol and direct



you to a website to learn more about how to recycle them. When you visit that website, you can plug in your zip code to find the closest store drop-off locations to recycle your Amazon packaging.

PIRG volunteers in California were directed to Target, Sprouts, and other stores across the Los Angeles area, and upon visiting those stores, they did in fact find bins accepting plastic recycling. To find out where the deposited plastic actually goes, the investigators put small electronic tracking devices in plastic Amazon bubble wrap envelopes and air pillows (which were labeled for store drop-off). They then dropped them in different plastic recycling drop bins across Los Angeles.

Of the 10 plastic items dropped off in recycling bins with an electronic tracker, four ended up in landfills, two ended up in a waste transfer center (meaning they're likely headed to a landfill), two went to out-of-state or out-of-country recycling centers, and two were last located at the Port of Los Angeles, headed to who knows where. None of them ended up in California recycling centers.

This small-scale experiment suggests that the store drop-off system for recycling Amazon packaging is failing—most likely because there is a very small market for recycling plastic film. (Note from Liz: A similar larger scale experiment that tracked plastic bags was conducted nationwide by ABC News with similar results. Most of those plastic bag drop-off stations at grocery stores are not being recycled! That's greenwashing. We've been lied to again!)

(Another note from Liz: Ridwell partners with a company that actually recycles plastic bags and Amazon bags to make TREX decking. And Washington County has started a program called Recycle+. All haulers in the county must offer this, but they don't advertise it well. Recycle+ takes plastic produce bags, shopping bags, dry cleaning bags, plastic padded envelopes including those from Amazon, and plastic overwrap for paper products such as napkins.)

So what should we do about it? We could push for improvements to recycling, but no matter how much Amazon and others want us to think recycling is the answer, for plastic it never has been and likely never will be. The better approach to plastic packaging is to just stop using it. That's why PIRG is calling on Amazon to eliminate single-use plastic in their shipments in the US, just as it's already committed to doing in Germany and India. PIRG is delivering thousands of petition signatures to Amazon urging it to act; and raising awareness of biodegradable and recyclable alternatives.



Horse, by Geraldine Brooks

What a tail! What a horse! Said to be the fastest ever thoroughbred in history, this was some horse even before all the story evolved around him. His lineage was chosen by a black man, and from there on in promises were broken to several black men. Deals were made and broken as well by white men, and all over this splendid horse: but it was the black men who cared.



The author begins a bit before the arrival of this horse as a foal in the 1840s and carries his story forward into today. Well, you say, a horse can't live that long. Maybe not, but his bones can, as well as portraits of him. You see, he really wasn't just any horse. Owned by a rich Southern gentleman who fancied thoroughbreds and racing, his life was only good so long as he was good, and ran, and ran fast. These he did, but he also had a most unusual trainer. The black man? Well, yes, and no. Race horses of that day often had a black trainer, but this one talked to him, played games with him, slept with him, even stole him once....

And the bones—why did they keep the bones? The paintings, how do they fit in? The black man? Just like yesterday's news.
