#### What Is the Diaconate? (Part 2)

In 2023, the ELCA is still calling Deacons to ministry. Currently, there are two paths for rostered ministry in the ELCA. One path is Word and Sacrament, which is the most familiar to people. These are the pastors - senior pastor, associate pastor, pastors in specialized ministry such as chaplaincy and campus ministry. They are the folks who are called to consecrate the eucharist and baptize.

# **ELCA**

THE DEACONESS COMMUNITY Deacons are Ministers of Word and Service. This path can include service to congrega-

tions, but it can also include other ministries out in the world such as education, family ministry, social services, or chaplaincy in hospitals, prisons, colleges, hospice, or churches. The ELCA defines this roster as connecting "the church with the needs of the world" and working "to equip others to lead a living, active, and caring Christian life." The difference between Word and Service and Word and Sacrament is that Word and Sacrament consecrates the eucharist and baptizes, which ministers in Word and Service must be authorized by the bishop to do. But Word and Service Ministers can do any other type of ministry.

Both of these rosters are now ordained once they have been approved by the Synod and accepted into a call. Ordination is new for Ministers of Word and Service as the result of a church-wide vote in 2019. They were consecrated in the past. While there was some controversy about the change, one of the strongest arguments for ordaining Word and Service Deacons is that not all organizations, such as the U.S. Military, recognize consecration. That can cause problems with employment for people working as chaplains, so this was a welcome change.

In addition to call within the Synod, there is also a Deaconess Community in the ELCA that has existed in the United States since the 19th century. This is a community of women that started in Germany and settled in Philadelphia. They were often confused for Catholic nuns as these women wore a garb and lived in community in a motherhouse. A few years after the group in Philadelphia was formed, another group began in Baltimore. In the 1970s, Deaconesses were allowed to marry and continued to respond to their call to intentional community and servant leadership. The Deaconess Community is an intergenerational group of women, who are compelled by the love of Christ to work in congregations, hospitals, social services, and there is even an attorney who works with underprivileged people. They are an amazing group of folks who work hard to connect by phone, mail, email, Zoom, and in person. Anyone who identifies as female and is an ordained Word and Service Minister can go through the process to become a part of the Deaconess Community. Just as there are steps one must take to become a rostered leader with the Synod, one must take separate steps to join the Deaconess Community.

#### **This Sunday!**

Also this Sunday, the second of two pre-Annual Meeting forums will be held in Fellowship Hall following worship, beginning about 10:45 am. Treasurer Tim Duggan will lead the presentation on finance and church budgeting for the coming fiscal year.

Since the congregation as a whole is charged with approving the budget during the Annual Meeting, this is background information that will be invaluable in informing your vote.

Congratulations to Gloria Au, Evan McGarvey, Tanner McQueen, and Keegan Ragan for their hard work. In April, these youth, joined by Satva Semenchalam, who will be officially confirmed following her baptism on June 11, presented their Statements of Faith to members of the Congregational Council. You may read these statements on the <u>church website</u>. Following confirmation, they become voting members of the congregation and will be entitled to cast their votes with all other members at the upcoming Annual Meeting. Confirmation does not represent the conclusion of anyone's faith journey, but is another step on a path that begins with baptism and continues throughout life.

Everyone is invited to join our confirmands and their families in a cake celebration following worship.

#### LWR Spring Ingathering Results

We had a successful Spring LWR Ingathering! Thank you for your generous donations and for those who volunteered at the Kit Assembly night and at the Ingathering itself. St. Andrew donated 41 quilts, 186 School Kits, and 23 Baby Kits.

The total collections from churches in Oregon, Idaho, Southwest Washington, and Northern California include:

- Quilts: 2,557
- School Kits: 365
- Personal Care Kits: 664
- Baby Care Kits: 328
- Fabric Kits: 2
- Fabric Yardage: 11

#### In total, we collected 11,469 pounds of supplies for people who have very little or nothing.

Lessons are developed and led by Lloyd Meyer, who has been teaching ESL for 20 years. Lloyd has taught in China and Latin America, as well as the U.S., and he is assisted at St. Andrew by Susan King, Scott Taylor, Joel Johnson, and Bonnie Bliesner. Lessons are typically held on Tuesday mornings at St. Andrew with Amina's youngest two children cared for in the Nursery by a team member.



Lloyd said he creates the lessons from scratch, building them around a theme and designing them to address real-life situations. Vocabulary is introduced, sentences formed, and questions asked to encourage Amina to wrestle with the language. Lloyd said he views teaching as performance art, and this week he used folk-singer Woody Guthrie's "This Land Is Your Land" to work on phonics and articulation. "Today's class was actu-

ally a choir lesson and a poetry seminar!" Lloyd told team members on Tuesday. Those of us who've interacted with Amina see growing confidence in her English conversational skills.

Amina is a trained teacher who taught geography in Afghanistan. I recently formed a Reading and Writing Study Group with Amina to focus more intentionally on English literacy, and we've included Husna, another Afghan woman who, unlike Amina, is not literate in her native language of Dari. I'm employing materials I've used in adult literacy programs, infusing them with ESL resources and relying on Amina's adept use of a Dari-English translation app to assist Husna. A young mom, Husna is from the same Afghan village as Amina's husband, Nasir. Like too many Afghan women, she did not have opportunity to attend school as a child. We began meeting at St. Andrew, but now often find it convenient to meet in Amina's warm and welcoming home.

Bonnie Bliesner and I often provide childcare as a component of assisting the Malik Zada family with medical and education appointments. We would welcome assistance! Please talk with one of us if you can help.

Systems Engineer Jan Smith led the group in figuring out how to put the puzzle pieces together for various committees. The Transition Team is responsible for getting the Congregation ready before the Call Committee begins. This is also a time for considering whether patterns of involvement, communication, and processes in the church are healthy or unhealthy, empowering or disempowering, or functioning optimally for the congregation. The task is to see that leadership develops in positive and creative ways for the good of the whole church.

On Saturday, May 27<sup>th</sup> the Transition Team led key leaders from the Executive Committee, Finance, Human Resources, Stewardship, and staff in an examination of our systems, communication, and processes. We worked together to explore the current state of roles and processes in order to identify gaps and issues. The group clarified roles and responsibilities, agreed to formally establish the Stewardship Committee in the Congregational Bylaws, and suggested improvements to be made by the Finance Committee to improve communication.

Over the next months we will be planning a Visioning Event to formalize a Congregational Vision statement that creates an ideal, unique image of the future for the common good. We pray for the Holy Spirit to continue to guide us in this work.
