Another Chance to Make School Bags

Every fall, we collect items to put in school bags for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). To be ready to have available bags, we need to start soon. We will meet in Fellowship Hall on <u>Monday</u>, <u>July 10</u>, at 9:30 am (latecomers welcome). We have 7 bags to start the count and we can consider how many more we can create. Will it be 100 or 400 or somewhere in between?

Note: Even if you aren't working on bag construction, you can be on the lookout for attractive, sturdy fabric and bring it to church. Donations of sturdy cloth are much appreciated!

Transition Team Work Continues

You may be wondering about the work of the Transition Team and how it relates to the Horizon Team and the upcoming Call process. Horizon Team work focused on listening and discernment, much of that work providing a foundation for the Transition Team. The work of the Transition Team is preparation; the work of the Call Team will be search and discernment.



During our preparation, we are following the Synod-provided detailed resource for <u>Congregations in Transition</u>; it outlines the work required during the Transition in preparation for the completion of the Mission Profile, which must be submitted before the Synod puts forward candidates.

The <u>Mission Profile</u> is a 10-page document that describes our congregational ministry and mission, and what characteristics we are looking for in a Lead Pastor. Over the past three months, the Transition Team has been setting the groundwork for completion of the Mission Profile. The input of the congregation is instrumental in completing this document. In July and August, we will be asking for your insight as we describe our Ministry Site Characteristics.

Look for the yellow poster in the Narthex. Each row lists a characteristic on the left and a characteristic on the right; please select the <u>one</u> term that you think best describes St. Andrew (one dot, per row, per person). For those not able to respond in person, you may complete the survey online; please complete the survey one time only at <u>Ministry Characteristics Survey</u>.

Plastic-Free July

What's Wrong with Using Plastic Anyway?

We've all heard about the huge problem with plastic pollution, how it's in our food and in all the world's waterways, as well as in our bodies. The Great Pacific Garbage Patch is twice the size of Texas, contains 1.8

billion pieces of floating plastic, and kills thousands of marine animals each year. It's so big that it has been nicknamed the "eighth continent."

But what about the manufacturing of plastic? Plastic is just a form of fossil fuel. Your plastic water bottle, your grocery bag, your foam tray full of meat are all made from oil or natural gas. And it takes a lot of energy to make that happen, which adds to the carbon footprint. "The real story of plastics' impact on the environment begins at the wellheads where it comes out of the ground," says Carroll Muffett, head of the Center for International Environmental Law. "And it never, ever stops."

By one estimate, emissions from producing and incinerating plastics could amount to 56 gigatons of carbon between now and 2050. That's almost 50 times the annual emissions of all of the coal power plants in the U.S.

It distresses me to see the recent ads on TV about the wonders of plastic. The oil companies are seeing the writing on the wall as the world (finally!) begins to move away from combustion engine vehicles. So they are adopting a new campaign trying to get people to use more plastic which is made from the oil they extract from the Earth. Ugh! We desperately need those fossil fuels to stay in the ground because of the carbon emitted when they are extracted.

The only thing we as individuals can do about this problem is to use less plastic in the first place. It's true that we still need certain plastics such as that used in medical equipment and our cars, but we can avoid using single-use plastics and try to steer clear of plastic containers.

This month I will share ideas to reduce or better yet—eliminate—single-use plastics from our lives.





The Spirituality Book Group will meet at 3:00 pm on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>July 23</u>, to discuss *How the Word Is Passed: A Reckoning with the History of Slavery Across America*, by Clint Smith. In this debut work of nonfiction, the author leads readers on a tour of landmarks and monuments to reveal some of America's stories hidden in plain sight. Consider Monticello, the Virginia plantation owned by Thomas Jefferson. It was here that Jefferson wrote letters espousing the urgent need for liberty—at the same time he enslaved more than 400 people. This well known history is augmented by other stories much less familiar, but all combining to illustrate slavery's role in shaping American history.


