### **Recycling: Is It Really So Great?**

Hi Friends, I am taking a 2-month recycling course being taught by Metro called the Master Recycler Program. The program may be misnamed as there is more discussion about many other Earth care topics than there is about recycling. For the next few months, I will be sharing with you what I am learning. And there is a lot!

I did not know this before, but Metro is a regional government in the greater Portland area. It's a 5th layer of government that we have that is unusual in most parts of the country. Metro includes most of Multnomah, Clackamas, and Washington counties, and it manages our garbage disposal and recycling for 1.5 million residents.



Recycling requires a lot of energy and it is not the best way to reduce waste.

One thing that is being emphasized again and again in this class is that recycling is actually not so great. Far more important than recycling is reducing the amount of stuff we buy and/or refusing to buy new things in the first place. The second most important thing we should be doing is reusing and/or repairing things rather than discarding them.

The process of recycling things (turning something old into a new product) takes a lot of energy. The manufacturing process, packaging, and transportation of those new products adds more carbon and other greenhouse gases to the atmosphere.

Recycling is still better than incinerating trash which pollutes the air, or landfilling trash which creates methane gas.

In the class, we've been told that we should embrace the trash can! We've all seen pictures of what happens when garbage companies go on strike in cities and the trash does not get picked up. It's a public health crisis.

This is what happens to our garbage: It gets picked up from our homes by a privately owned company and taken to one of two transfer stations within the Portland Metro area where there is an effort to remove some recyclable things such as cardboard from the trash. But this is done by hand so a lot gets missed, and a great deal of recyclable material still goes to the landfill. Longhaul semi trucks get filled with 34 tons each of garbage from the garbage trucks. The semi trucks drive 150 miles east on I-84 to Arlington, Oregon to a gigantic landfill. The landfill in Arlington also takes Seattle's garbage.

<u>Problems with Recycling:</u> Recycling used to be profitable, but not so much anymore. It has become expensive, especially in the U.S. The reasons have to do with the global market for scrap material, the price of oil, and our continued reliance on cheap, singleuse products. It takes time, money, labor, and energy to collect and process recycled goods. Recycling is not equitable; not everyone has the same access to recycling options, especially in multifamily dwellings like apartments. The rules for recycling are confusing since every garbage company, every city, and every county has its own recycling rules. And lack of responsible recycling means that a lot of contaminants (things that don't belong there) end up in the recycle bin. This clogs and fouls the machines that sort the recyclables and workers sometimes get injured.

Oregon's Bottle Bill: Oregon was the first state to pass the bottle bill in 1971. The advantage of recycling beverage bottles is that it is a very clean stream of recyclable material as nothing but the glass, aluminum, or plastic bottles gets into the mix. The glass, aluminum, and plastic are easily separated. 100% of the material collected is actually recycled, whereas 8% to 25% of the material returned through curbside recycling is either not recyclable, contaminated, or is missed during the sorting process, meaning that a lot of the material in those systems ends up in the landfill. At St. Andrew, we enjoy the additional benefit of supporting our kids when we take our bottles to the bottle-drop site in the blue bags.

Remember: Reduce/refuse, Reuse/repair, and—if those are not options—then recycle!


