I graduated with my Master of Divinity in 2018, completed two units of Clinical Pastoral Education in 2018 and 2019, and completed all of the writing and interviewing with the Synod to become ordained on June 25, 2023. During all of that time, I have been living as a candidate in community with the ELCA Deaconess Community.

Once I was ordained, I could become an official part of the ELCA Deaconess Community and I am excited to be living in community with this amazing group of women. Living in community means meeting once a year in person at assembly, via Zoom for book study groups, prayer, or meetings, and/or communicating by email, mail, phone, and in person when possible. Our group spans the generations as some of our Sisters have been around long before Deaconesses began to marry and live outside of a community residence. All of us are or have been involved in ministry, and we find strength, support, and value in being a part of this group of Sisters. 5 Reasons Fantasy Football Is Cool

This year is the first time someone else got to pick her favorite QB and Oregon Duck, Justin Herbert. This trophy is in her honor and is on display in the Narthex for anyone who'd like to see it.

I loved this book. The author writes as if he's talking to you and he's such an ordinary guy – and actually somewhat of a jerk. But it's his chronicle of life and learning about God. Finding God where he finds him and, sometimes, where he finds himself. Miller has roots in Portland, attended Reed College for an interesting set of reasons and, while he doesn't exactly drop names, some things mentioned feel really familiar.



The author becomes more likeable the more human he becomes, the more flawed, the more his thoughts about God evolve. You have to stay with him. He doesn't remain a jerk; he does change. He meanders through his memories, his friends, and his thoughts and keeps improving/adjusting his theories about God. At the end, he's convinced of God's love for him. Maybe there is help for us all.

Using the Climate Action Now (CAN) App!

Hi Friends,

I found an app called CAN (which stands for Climate Action Now) that makes it so easy to take meaningful climate action on your phone in just a few minutes. With most actions you take, you earn points, and when enough points are earned CAN plants a tree on your behalf. You can take a few recommended actions every day or choose from a library of actions. You decide how many actions to take as often as you choose.



The actions offered are things like sending pre-written emails that you can modify to legislators and politicians, policy-makers, businesses, and other organizations. Or reading articles that you can share with others. Or taking quizzes that help you learn about climate issues. You can skip any you don't want to partake in and go to a different action.

Earn trees and save lives. Planting trees is important because as they grow, they remove carbon from the air, store it in the tree and soil, and release oxygen into the air. CAN has a tree planting partner, Eden Reforestation Projects, that works in underdeveloped and impoverished regions, providing employment for local populations which saves lives. Eden uses an "employ to plant" strategy that restores the environment while providing needed jobs so the local economy can grow. Preventing extreme poverty saves lives.

The more actions you take, the more points you get. The more points you get, the more trees get planted.

Following is a quote from CAN:

Why Climate Action Now? Because everybody needs a way to get involved. We realize most people can't devote their lives to working on climate solutions, but everybody has a few extra minutes throughout their day, whether standing in line or waiting for an appointment, and most of us have a phone at the ready. If we have installed the Climate Action Now app on our phones, then we have everything we need to add our voices and our energy to the groundswell of people calling for a new and better sustainable world.

We are in business to save the planet and we are committed to making a difference – channeling our frustration, anger and fear by launching an app that will put thousands of planet-saving actions at the fingertips of millions. Actions that can be taken in just minutes. We can do this.

We can change behaviors. We can change attitudes. We can help change laws. We can change what people consume. We can change the trajectory of global warming if we all work together, each doing our own small part. The collective actions of all of us around the world can bring about positive change.

This is important work. It has become our life work. There is much to be done, and everybody can help. For our kids. For our grandkids. For all life on the planet.

Western Farm Workers: Food & Clothing Collection, Advocacy Need, and Car Donation

The Service Team is collecting food and clothing during September to support the Western Farm Workers (WFW). These are the workers who work 12-hour days, 7 days a week, to pick the fresh fruit and vegetables we enjoy.



This year, food is especially needed as the WFW food pantry is very low because of reduced harvests resulting from weather events this past spring. There is not enough work due to crop shortages, so workers are scheduled for fewer work hours. Many families are living on less than \$40 a day, which is insufficient to cover food and housing costs. The following food items are the highest priority at this time:

Clothing is also being requested by the WFW this fall. Contributions must be gently used or new—and clean! Clothing NOT needed includes sleepwear, swimsuits, and negligees. Clothing desperately needed at this time includes:

Barrels to collect the food and clothing are in the Narthex.

Western Farm Workers are also looking for advocates to help fight high water rate increases in the county. These are a result of large data centers being built that require water to cool their equipment. Many Western Farm Workers are having their water cut off because they're unable to pay the bill.
