Special Worship Service for 70th Anniversary

Our worship service this <u>Sunday</u>, <u>September 24</u>, will be different from our usual worship service. The order for worship was taken from the *Common Service Book of the Lutheran Church*, published in 1918 by the United Lutheran Church in America. This is a liturgy that was used at the time St. Andrew was founded. Due to social norms in the Lutheran church at that time, this



service uses exclusively masculine and patriarchal language for God. Additionally, it refers to clergy in exclusively masculine terms. It is important to note that these are not values currently held by the community of St. Andrew, nor the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

In the course of planning this service, much discussion was had about whether or not to alter the texts to reflect our current values. In the end, it was felt that retaining the historical language was important. This service gives us a peek into the liturgical life of St. Andrew 70 years ago, reminds us of ways we've grown and changed as the body of Christ, and, we hope, inspires us to continue seeking God's will for the church going forward. A special thanks to Allison Katsufrakis and Libby Calhoun for the design and preparation of this liturgy.

Climate Corner: Gas-Powered Leaf Blowers

It's no wonder that there's been a growing movement to ban gaspowered leaf blowers across the country, including in Portland. The noise they make might be the most immediate issue, but their environmental impact could be worse. Read below for more on what damage they cause — and for possible alternatives available to us in the Portland area.

Worse Than Noise: Even people who use leaf blowers acknowledge that they are obnoxiously loud. The sound level for the person holding a leaf blower exceeds 100 decibels which exceeds the World Health Organization's outdoor daytime standards of 55 decibels for up to 800 feet, which is about 2 blocks away.



But leaf blowers do more harm than just making noise. Gaspowered landscape equipment has an outsized environmental impact. In California, leaf blowers contribute more to pollution than vehicles do. Most models utilize a 2-stroke engine where only 70% of the fuel completely combusts. As a result, 2-stroke engines produce nearly 300 times the greenhouse gas emissions of a pickup truck!

Blowers blast air up to 280 miles per hour which can erode topsoil and disperse pollen, fertilizers, and herbicides into the air. Insects can be blasted from their habitats and birds are driven away.

Environmental Justice: The people using the machines experience the most impact. While the noise is an irritation to neighbors, the user (even with ear protection) is at risk for permanent hearing loss from cumulative exposure to high volume. The machine operator is also at ground zero for exposure to the pollutants (carbon monoxide and unburned fuel) that are released. Landscape workers running a leaf blower inhale 10 times more ultra-fine particles than someone standing next to a busy road. A homeowner may choose that risk for an hour on the weekend, but the people who are most affected are landscape workers. Nationally, 46% of landscape workers are Latino, a group that already suffers disproportional impacts of environmental injustice.

Better Blowers and Landscapers: There is already growing momentum across the country to ban gas-powered blowers; more than 100 municipalities already have some restrictions. While electric blowers used to be less effective than gas-powered blowers, today they are just as effective. It's true that landscapers who use electric blowers are more expensive because the batteries are expensive, but what you are paying for is worker safety, less noise pollution, and less environmental damage. If you hire a landscaper, make sure they provide high quality dust masks, safety goggles, and ear protection for their workers.

<u>Alternatives</u>: Several yard maintenance contractors in the Portland area provide "Quiet and Clean Yard Services." Check the Earth Care kiosk in the Narthex for descriptions and contact information for 23 yard service providers.
