Job Openings at St. Andrew

St. Andrew is currently advertising to fill two part-time positions: an Interim Keyboardist and a Nursery Attendant.

Interim Minister of Music Susan Reiser will continue to regularly lead worship on the organ, so applicants for the Interim Keyboardist position are not required to be proficient on that instrument. Instead, the church is looking to identify someone to provide piano accompaniment for the Sanctuary Choir during Wednesday night rehearsals and twice a month on Sunday mornings. The person will also serve as the keyboardist for one Sunday worship service each month. This 10-hours per week position is expected to continue through May 31, 2024, with the possibility of extension.

Special Congregational Meeting

A special meeting of the St. Andrew congregation will be held following worship on <u>Sunday, October 29</u>, for the purpose of approving adjustments to the budget for fiscal year 2023-2024. We will meet in Fellowship Hall for a short meeting beginning at 11:00 am. Please note that we must have 10 percent of the voting members present to establish a quorum.

In addition to voting on budget changes, the meeting will enable a vote on approving the amended Constitution that was shared with the congregation prior to the Annual Meeting on June 13, 2023. Go to

Please note that the ELCA requires its member congregations to update their constitutions every three years to comply with the ELCA model constitution. St. Andrew's current Constitution was approved in 2014, so this update is long overdue. To learn more about ELCA requirements, go to

Luther's 95 Theses or Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences were posted almost 506 years ago on October 31, 1517. As the title suggests, the main theme was the paying of indulgences for the reduction of one's sins. These 95 Theses were Luther's suggestions for reforming the Catholic Church to better reflect his beliefs on spirituality as reflected in the Bible. Since the beginning, Lutherans have recognized the Gift of God's grace rather than indulgences. As society has changed over the centuries, are there reforms in the church that you'd like to see?

Securing St. Andrew's PIPE Line

What does PIPE mean to the church and why does it matter? An acronym for Property Improvement Projects & Emergencies, the PIPE Fund is one of St. Andrew's designated funds. Its purpose is explained by its name.

When the elevator failed a few years ago, the PIPE Fund was used to repair it; when additional chairs or tables are needed, those costs come from the PIPE Fund; when our freezer failed, the PIPE Fund replaced it; when the roof leaks, the PIPE Fund covers the cost of repairs; when walls need paint, the PIPE Fund is once again tapped.

This past fiscal year, when we realized the need to enter into a roofing maintenance contract, as well as one for our heating and air conditioning, the PIPE Fund was used to establish those relationships. In that case, funds were allocated for one year only as those costs could be incorporated into the church's operating budget for future years.

Each month when Highlights from the Finance Team are shared via "Weekly News," congregants can see the balance available in this fund. The PIPE Fund actually consists of two parts: a general fund and one specifically to be used for Wetlands Improvements. The current total balance in the fund is approximately \$17,000—with \$8,400 of that reserved for Wetland Improvements.

This is the lowest balance St. Andrew has seen in years. In June 2022, this fund held more than \$56,000, a healthy reserve to have on hand should emergencies arise. Our reserve for building improvements and emergencies is now less than \$10,000 — and that may well continue to decrease unless donors add to the pot.

As our building gets older, it becomes more likely that systems will fail, things will break, and repair needs will increase. Your gifts to the PIPE Fund ensure that the Facilities Team can provide sufficient upkeep for our building and grounds. Thank you for all your gifts to St. Andrew! Each and every one is greatly appreciated.

Recycling & Composting: What Goes Where

Today I'll talk about what I learned last week from my Master Recycler class. In this part of Oregon, we are pretty good at recycling. But we could do better. There are still about 14% of things that could have been recycled that end up in the landfill. And 9% of what people put into their recycle bins doesn't belong there. It's garbage. That means processors have to deal with about 9,000 tons of contaminants a year. We can do better!

Recycle bin:

- ◆ Paper: Newsprint, catalogs, magazines, and phone books. Cardboard boxes flattened or cut to size so it fits in the bin. Do not bundle and wrap with twine or tape. Pizza boxes are OK if there are grease spots, but no stuck-on food or cheese. Paperboard boxes such as cereal boxes or any box that is not for frozen food. Frozen food boxes have a plastic coating. Scrap paper, junk mail (you do not have to remove the little window in envelopes), fax paper, wrapping paper, and tissue wrapping paper. Cartons for milk, juice, and soup. It's best to cut out the plastic pour spout. Shredded paper must go into a paper bag.
- ◆ Plastic: Any bottle with a neck 6 oz. or more, yogurt or cottage cheese type tubs 6 oz. or more, plant pots from nurseries 4" or larger, and any plastic buckets 5 gallons or smaller.



• Metal: Aluminum trays or pie plates and aluminum foil if it is relatively clean (make it into a ball). Tin and steel food cans (labels are OK, put the lid inside the can and crimp can so lid can't fall out). Empty, dry, metal paint cans (paint has to be dry, put lid inside the can). Empty aerosol cans without plastic lid. Scrap metal smaller than 2" can go loose in the recycle bin or inside a food can and crimped closed (metal lids, bottle caps, screws, nails). Metal must be smaller than 30" and weigh less than 30 pounds.

<u>Not</u> for the recycle bin: single-use coffee cups, freezer boxes, plastic bags, food-soiled paper or take-out containers, clamshells or lids, tire chains, propane tanks, or receipts. Receipts are made of thermal paper, not regular paper.

Glass bin:

• Food jars and bottles only. It's OK to mix colors.

<u>Not</u> for the glass bin: Non-food glass such as drinking glasses, vases, ceramics, mirrors, dishes, light bulbs, or windows. No broken glass either.

Yard Debris bin:

- Weeds, leaves, vines, grass, small branches less than 4" thick, house plants, spoiled uncooked produce, and windfall fruit & veggies from the garden.
- If you live within the city limits of Beaverton, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Lake Oswego, Milwaukie, Portland, or Wilsonville, you can put all food scraps in your yard waste can, including meat, bones, shells, cooked food, paper napkins and paper towels, paper bags, and the compostable kitchen

scraps pail liners. Be aware that the compostable pail liners will start to break down in a couple of days. (These are different than the "compostable" tableware and packaging discussed in last week's article.) If you live in unincorporated Washington County, you cannot add food waste to your yard waste.

<u>Not</u> for the yard waste bin: grease, cooking oil, liquids, ashes, dirt, rocks, sod, sawdust, stumps, treated wood, pet waste, branches larger than 4" in diameter, corks, items labeled as compostable (kitchen scraps pail liners are OK).

Garbage can:

Paper plates, single-use coffee cups, frozen food boxes, takeout containers, receipts, pet food bags, facial tissue, plastic containers and tableware labeled as compostable, old dishes or Tupperware, painted or stained wood or plywood, empty motor oil and pesticide containers, incandescent light bulbs, and broken stuff.

These things need to be bagged before discarding: pet waste and cat litter, ashes and sawdust, packing peanuts.

Plastic bags can go to most grocery stores. Clamshells can go to New Seasons.






