Should You Join a Buy Nothing Group?

Adapted from an article by Geoff Williams U.S. News September 7, 2021

In 2013, two friends on Bainbridge Island, Washington created a gift-giving group. The idea was that instead of bartering or offering gifts with strings attached, you'd just give away stuff you don't want to people in your community who might be able to use it. It's the ultimate spending diet! Buy Nothing Groups are popping up all over the world through the Buy Nothing Project. You can access the Buy Nothing Project via an app from the Apple App Store, or from Google Play on your phone. You can also access it on Facebook: enter "buy nothing project Beaverton" (or the name of your community) in the search bar to sign up. The idea is to deal with folks close to where you live. This avoids shipping costs.

Buy Nothing Group members offer up many things such as baby gear, furniture, clothes, books, toys, tools, and much more.

Reasons to join a Buy Nothing Group:

- Save money and live better when money is tight
- Do something good for the planet by keeping things out of the landfill
- Feel good about giving to those in need
- Get rid of clutter and/or downsize
- Get to know your neighbors



What are the Buy Nothing Group rules? The only rule is to "give freely." There should be no expectation of rewards or compensation. According to the Buy Nothing Project website, "trading, bartering, buying or selling is counter to the Buy Nothing Project mission." The site also suggests that members

"give creatively," for example by sharing skills or through community lending libraries, clothing share events and bike programs. You could teach others to sew, to bake, to fix things, or any other skills you have and want to share.

Note: There is a Buy Nothing Day that has nothing to do with the Buy Nothing movement. Buy Nothing Day was started as a protest against consumerism, countering Black Friday.

The main thing to remember is that "buy nothing" isn't all or nothing. By joining, you aren't pledging to never buy anything again, never hold a garage sale, or never list something for sale. Of course, you're going to shop and live your life. But by joining a Buy Nothing Group, you may be able to seamlessly incorporate it into your life and enjoy some of the benefits while getting to know more people in your neighborhood.

In any case, when you have stuff that you no longer want but don't feel like selling and are loathe to throw away, your local Buy Nothing Group can help.

Besides, it just feels good!

Please check your spam folder FIRST *before* contacting us for another login.

***These new system-generated passwords will expire on December 7, 2023. <u>LOG IN BEFORE THEN</u>. You can reset the password anytime yourself by using the "Forgot Password" option.

- If you successfully logged into your FellowshipOne GO account last year, please verify now that your giving record for 2023 is current and let us know ONLY if there are errors.
- Please send your questions to our *confidential* team email at <u>financial secretary@standrewlutheran.com</u> (with an underscore, *not* a dash) and we will respond as soon as possible.
- Once in your account profile, you can review your giving history, print your giving statement, and even update your personal information. We hope this personalized access is an easier way to access your giving record at any given time.
- For those who still need a hard copy 2023 statement, <u>no worries</u>. More instructions will be provided <u>in late January</u>. <u>Please DO NOT request 2023 year-end statements just yet.</u>

Stock Transfer Donation Process for Tax Year 2023

Greetings from the Financial Secretaries of St. Andrew. As the end of the calendar year approaches, we want to inform you of the process of donating stock to the church.

Contributions must actually be paid before the close of the year to be deductible in 2023. Therefore, please allow at least 3 weeks or more for the completion of the transfer. Please start the process as soon as possible. The deadline is <u>Friday</u>, <u>December 8, 2023</u> for it to be included in the 2023 tax year.

We ask you to take the necessary steps if you intend to donate stock to St. Andrew this tax year:

- **1.** Download the Stock Transfer Form found on our church website or contact the church office.
- **2.** Contact your brokerage firm to initiate an electronic transfer of securities (see form for instructions/ details). *We cannot do this for you.*
- **3.** Complete the form including your intentions for the use of the donation <u>and</u> email a copy to

financial secretary@standrewlutheran.com.

If you prefer, you may send a copy to the church office marked *confidential for Financial Secretaries*. This form must be turned in at the beginning of the process. Without this form, we cannot complete your request.

4. Upon receipt of the form, Tammy Piscitelli will be in contact with you regarding the progress of the electronic stock transfer to the church's securities firm, Charles Schwab, and the sale of the stocks you've donated to St. Andrew.
