



Amazon description:

For all who know the security of home—in all its iterations—and for those who don't, finding home is complicated. Home always is characterized by joy and sorrow, grief and gladness, the realities of complicated lives. What is it like to flee the horrors of war as a refugee in search of home? When daily life is unbearable, what exactly does home mean? How do we learn to be at home in our bodies, at home with ourselves? What does it mean to be made in the likeness of the Holy One? Can we find home in the company of strangers



and how do we reclaim our earth home? So many images swim just below the surface of my memory, all the houses where I came to know home. It takes little to retrieve them—a shared story, the pungent smell of tide flats, the sound of rain on a tin roof. But home, of course, is much more than houses. These reflections invite readers to explore identity, the importance of rootedness, discovering home away from home, what it means to be home for one another. Finding home—literally and metaphorically—is challenging.

St. Andrew is in Beaverton, Oregon, a suburban residential community west of Portland, Oregon. Beaverton is located between the Portland West Hills and Tualatin Valley farmlands. St Andrew members primarily live in Beaverton and the surrounding suburban communities of Bethany, Aloha, Hillsboro, and Tigard. The area includes wineries, historic landmarks, international restaurants, shops, the Reser Center for the Arts, as well as professional sports, and museums in the City of Portland.

Beaverton is home to Oregon's largest employer, Nike, and its global headquarters, as well as several tech companies, including Intel. Many congregation members are/were employed with local healthcare services, university and k-12 teaching positions, the technology industry, and government services. An active outdoor lifestyle is supported by the Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District, which is the largest special park district in Oregon, with 90 park sites, 60 miles of hard and soft-paved trails for walking and biking, and more than 15,000 acres of natural area. One of the three lakes in the park district, Commonwealth Park, is locat-



ed within a block of St. Andrew. Additional opportunities for outdoor activities are available on Mt Hood, in the Columbia Gorge, and at the Pacific Ocean, all within 90 minutes of Beaverton.

Median house prices in Beaverton, OR are \$443,182. The more expensive areas tend to be in the north and south parts, while more affordable homes are in the west regions. Of the 40,537 occupied housing units in Beaverton, 49.64% are owner-occupied.

Beaverton School District is ranked in the top 5% of Oregon schools, with 39,253 students, in 55 schools in grades PK, and K-12. The student-teacher ratio is 18 to 1. Minority enrollment is 57% of the student body, the majority is Hispanic. The school district is diverse which is evident in the 97 languages spoken by district school students.

In Beaverton, 98.3% of adults have a high school diploma, and 46.97% have earned a bachelor's degree or higher. The congregational members have a high level of education similar to or slightly higher than the community.

Despite the homogeneous nature of our congregation and community, both the members of St. Andrew and the community are diverse in race, religion, gender, gender identity, and cultural differences. We are a Reconciling in Christ Church (RIC) with a history of female and LGBTQ pastoral and congregational leadership.

# Climate Corner: Tips for a Sustainable Holiday Meal

The gathering of family and friends for holiday meals is a joyous part of this season. You can have fun and be considerate of the environment. Avoiding waste and being considerate of Mother Nature is simple if you remember some easy tips while planning and during a celebration.

**Decorating:** Consider using natural materials such as leaves, fruits, or tree pruning's to make your home feel festive. Using nature as an inspiration for the centerpiece at your table for example, is a wise way to eliminate the need to purchase wasteful, sin-

gle-use items. Using nature's vibrant color palette can also be stunning and complement your food and drinks. I just pruned one of my trees and used the branches I cut off to make a Christmas swag for my front door. New Seasons has locally-made wreaths that are 100% compostable; they are not held together with a wire frame.



<u>Meal planning</u>: Once you know your guest list, make a meal plan and create your shopping list from that plan. Don't forget to shop your cupboards and refrigerator first so you don't buy more of what you already have. Try not to fix more than people will eat, unless left-overs are part of the plan.

<u>Shop locally and seasonally:</u> Try to buy from local farms and look for food that comes from the Pacific Northwest rather than



from Mexico or Peru to reduce the distance your food travels from farm to plate. Buy what is in season such as greens, carrots, root vegetables, pears and apples. While the Beaverton Farmer's Market is closed for the season, the Portland State Farmer's Market is open all year long.

<u>Consider less meat and more plant-based menu options</u>: Meats that come from factory farms are massive contributors to greenhouse gasses, especially beef. Replacing meat with plant based options will reduce our carbon footprint. Or look for local farms that practice regenerative farming. Check out the Meat Market at 11900 SW Canyon Rd.

<u>Prevent/reduce food waste</u>: Set the tone for a no-waste gettogether by asking your guests to bring their own reusable containers so you can send them home with leftovers. You want to avoid throwing food into the trash at all costs as it is a huge contributor of methane gas. Get creative with food scraps and leftovers. Try to use all your ingredients. For example, you can make stock out of leftover turkey bones or

vegetable stock with vegetable peelings. Try to make new dishes out of your leftovers so you don't get bored with the same meals. Make turkey enchiladas or scrambled eggs with some leftover veggies. Freeze leftovers so you can eat them later.



**Compost the undesirable food scraps:** Again, you want to keep food scraps out of the trash. Food waste is the third largest contributor to methane greenhouse gas. If you don't have a compost pile and if you can't add food waste to your yard waste can (check with your garbage hauling company), you can donate your food scraps to a local farmer. You can freeze the leftover peelings and food scraps until you have the time to take it to a farmer.
