Ministry Site Profile— Call Process Moves Forward

St. Andrew's Ministry Site Profile was posted by the Bishop's office in December, making it available for prospective pastoral candidates to review.

In December the Call Committee participated in Implicit Bias Training with Pastor Melissa Reed. This process helped us to understand how our brains categorize and organize perceptions about people and things that unknowingly impact our decision making.

The Call Committee has also developed candidate interview questions for Zoom and in-person interviews. The areas of focus for the interviews include: personal spiritual life and calling of the candidate, leadership, worship, communication, children and youth, Christian education, conflict, diversity and inclusion, and Earth care. This week we will participate in a practice Zoom interview with a pastor not involved in a call. This will help us refine and improve our process.

The most exciting update is that on Monday, February 5, the Call Committee will receive information on a slate of candidates that best matches our needs. Please continue to hold the Call Committee, pastoral candidates, and the process in your prayers.

Beyond the Curb – Old Clothing

Information from my Master Recycler Handbook

When donating clothing to drop-off centers and reuse organizations, it is important to ask questions about what happens to the items after you leave them there. The reused clothing industry has a surprisingly negative impact on the environment and on markets around the world.

The problem: According to NPR, the average American discards more than 10 pounds of clothes each year. The EPA states that 13.1 million tons of textiles are landfilled yearly. The recovery rate of used clothing is about 15.3%; about half of that is recovered by going to reuse charities such as thrift shops, Union Gospel Mission, Clothes for Kids (formerly Beaverton Clothes Closet), St. Vincent de Paul, and Goodwill. Charities receive so many donations that they can only keep the clothes for a short time. Goodwill reports that they receive one billion pieces of clothing every year. In order not to be overwhelmed, they don't keep inventory for



more than 3 weeks, when most of it is exported. The clothes are sold in bulk for 6 to 12 cents/pound to companies that export the clothes to developing countries. According to Oxfam, about 50% of used clothes are shipped to Africa and Latin America; Goodwill makes about \$2 billion in exports every year.

We assume that the clothes we donate help the countries receiving them, but Oxfam and the UN want us to think again. In 2002, the UN estimated that tens of thousands of textile workers in Africa lost their jobs due to the used clothes industry. Alarmed by this trend, the UN encouraged developing nations to ban the sale of used clothes. Thirty countries have adopted such bans.

The fundamental cause is that garments are being made so cheaply that they have essentially become a disposable product. They aren't meant to last. Hence the term, "fast fashion." So as long as we are hungry for cheap clothes, materials will continue to be pumped through at this alarming rate. This trend drastically affects the livelihood and culture of communities worldwide.

What can we do? We can take care of our clothes. Wash them on gentle cycles with cold water and low dryer level. Better yet, dry them on a clothes line or clothes drying rack to avoid the extreme heat of the dryer that is hard on clothes. I find that by putting items in the dryer for only 5 or 10 minutes, they are not stiff when dried on the clothes line. Don't wear clothes only



once before washing unless they are visibly soiled and actually dirty. All that lint in your dryer is tiny bits of your clothes being washed away. Mend torn clothes, patch holes, sew on buttons, and darn socks. If you can't do it, look for repair fairs or ask a seamstress you know for help. Dry cleaners will mend clothes as well and knit shops often provide a darning service.


Andy's Room Podcast

Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends of St. Andrew,

In our worship over the past seven months or so, we have periodically invited the congregation to a unison "Act of Faith" statement. You might have wondered, where do these come from? Where did the Apostles' Creed go? These statements are modern and not official creeds. Why are we using these words?



Over the past years, St. Andrew has had some conversation and education around creeds, and specifically, the Apostles' Creed. These statements, from the Worship Planning team, are a response to a few members of the congregation requesting contemporary, inclusive, and creative language. So, we've been experimenting with different statements during different liturgical seasons. When we enter Lent, we'll be back to using the Apostles' Creed again.

Some members have expressed appreciation for words in worship that are more accessible to them. And other people have missed saying the Apostles' Creed every week. It's not surprising that there are differences over this, as with some other aspects of worship. Oftentimes, it boils down to those of us who learned the traditional words in our youth. For that group, it's a grounding central aspect of worship. For others, the non-inclusive language, and the patriarchal roots of the creed are challenging. Feelings about this can run high, for some. What do we do?

First, remember that we are one in Christ. Viewing our worship through the lens of Christ, we should be able to bear with one another and have compassion and appreciation for our differences. There may be some aspect of worship that is really bugging you, but your neighbor in the pew may find it most meaningful! Can we approach worship with that awareness, together?

Secondly: Words matter. I think what exacerbates these different preferences is that we are saying the words aloud. No one wants to say "I believe. . ." to something that they are not authentically able to affirm. So, please, it is your right, and need, as a thoughtful being, to keep silent in the places that you can't affirm. Maybe we even say the Lord's Prayer with different words. That is all okay. God's love is with us, and we find our unity in the love of Christ.

If you want to talk about this with me, please come by or call. . . I want to learn more about you and your beliefs.


