Sanctuary Team Update

Dear St. Andrew,

One of the vibrant ministries we are supporting is that of our Sanctuary Team. From April 7 to May 12, the Sanctuary Team will be sharing some timely and thoughtful classes on *Sanctuary in Our Time and Place*. The meaning, theology, and urgency of sanctuary will be the focus, including the Biblical imperative to welcome the sojourner, and what that means now, 2024, in the United States. Included in this series will be stories shared by the Malik Zada and Hashemi families. St. Andrew has been building friendships and assisting both families. Sayed Rasool Hashemi was an interpreter for US forces in Afghanistan and has the English skills to help share stories from the Malik Zadas and his own family.

The class will also address providing refuge and sanctuary amid local disaster. The January winter storm, which drew members of the congregation to seek shelter here, pointed out both a need and a potential, and St. Andrew is in conversation with the Red Cross for some kind of partnership/support.

The final class gathering will include a celebration potluck, sharing plant-based food.

This creative series of 5 classes is sure to provide lots of thoughtful and informative conversations. I believe it will be a great expression of how St. Andrew is living out its values, in specific and meaningful ways. I hope you'll be part of the conversations.

Call Process Advances

The Call Committee has completed interviews with five very qualified candidates for lead pastor. After prayer, pondering, discernment, and much discussion, the Call Committee is now ready to proceed in early April with an in-person meeting with a candidate that we think best meets the needs of St. Andrew.

The in-person meeting will include time for the Call Committee to learn more about the Candidate, time for the Candidate to learn more about our ministry, a tour of St. Andrew, a shared meal, and opportunity for the candidate to learn about the community.

The Call Committee and Candidate continue in discernment before any final recommendations are made. To learn more about the Call process, check out the updated Call Process poster in the Narthex or ask a member of the Call Committee.

Resourceful Living Part I: Reusing and Repurposing

From the Master Recycler Handbook

There is mounting evidence that the accumulation of material possessions, beyond basic needs, does not help us feel more creative, connected, secure, or healthy. There is such a thing as enough when it comes to possessions.

Upcycled or repurposed, second hand, salvage, and vintage--all of these words essentially mean reuse, and reusing can save you money and space and avoid waste. Many items can easily be found at second-hand stores. The easiest form of reuse is to use durable products instead of disposable products, such as coffee mugs or water bottles. Some take-out containers are quite reusable and can even go into the dishwasher so they can be used again and again.

Purchase reused. Explore our region's many second-hand stores to find newto-you clothing, furniture, electronics, household or craft items, salvaged building materials, and more.

Non-profit and for-profit resale shops exist in all parts of our region. Do some internet searching using phrases like resale, vintage, consignment, second hand, and gently used. You will find places to buy used furniture, tools, and electrical cords, clothes, baby accessories, and more.

Online reuse shopping. There are many great resources for the online shopper. Most of us are familiar with Freecycle or Craigslist as great ways to find bargains, but there are many more resources for reuse online.

Repurposing. So far we have been talking about reusing items in the way that they were originally meant to be used. We can also avoid

waste and spending extra money by repurposing the objects that we already have to meet a new or different need.
