I am so excited to announce a brand new, community-focused event for younger adults, Night of Stories! This monthly event is a cooperative effort between three organizations: St Andrew, The Repentant Church (a recent start-up through the United Methodist Church), and also the Portland-based storytelling nonprofit Ghost Light PDX. The first iteration of Night of Stories will be hosted on Sunday, March 24, 6:00 - 8:00 pm, at Grinds and Vines coffee shop in Portland. The theme

for the night is "The Thousand Word Picture Show." Plans include a photo booth, caption contest, featured storytellers, live music, and the chance for you to share stories of your own in a safe, fun, and casual environment. No preparation is needed to attend; just come as you are!

To understand the vision for this event, check out our opening creed:

> Maybe. Just maybe. There's nothing more human than to tell a story. From that night, thousands of years ago, when cavemen sat around that very first campfire, looking up at the stars in wonder, telling each other jokes... To the stories we tell in quiet reverence, when we gather together to grieve a loved one lost. To be human is to tell stories. Even when we sleep, our brain is up all night telling us stories in the form of dreams.

> Friends, our desire is to be a beautiful and weird experiment. To share our stories with each other, whether they are tales of wonder or woe, the sacred or profane, soul stirring or just plain weird.

But most of all: We share stories with each other, so that maybe, just maybe, we might come to see ourselves, see each other, and see this weary little world of ours, as cherished works of art.

In February we hosted a small test run of the event with about 16 people, all under the age of 35, and it was a huge hit! We are so excited to open it up for this official launch. # Help Write Postcards/Letters to **Potential Voters**

2024 is another Presidential election year and this year's vote is expected to be a crucial one. Given the expected candidate choices, many people are planning not to vote at all. Liz Hardy and Jan Smith have contacted several organizations that encourage first-time voters or those who typically do not vote to do so this year.

St. Andrew has participated in campaigns like this effort in the past. The 2024 effort includes primary elections and the general election on November 5. With primary elections scheduled during the first half of the year, the postcard You Voice Matters. and letter-writing campaigns will take place between now and November.



Already, thousands of postcards have been sent to North Carolina voters whose primary election was on March 5. These cards were from the Environmental Voter Project, and the message sent was, "I know you are a good voter. Please make sure your friends and family are good voters too!" Mind you, these cards were sent to people who are concerned about the environment, but do not typically vote. Whether or not a person votes is public record, but how they vote is not known.

Jan and Liz are looking for a team of people to send encouraging messages to potential voters. No specific postcard or letterwriting dates have been scheduled, but they will be soon. Many of you wrote postcards to Georgia voters in 2020, and to Arizona, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Georgia in 2022. This will be a similar effort. There will be several state campaigns again and Federal elections by state as well. We will have training sessions again and volunteers will be able to take groups of 20 cards or letters to fill out and send by specific dates. Voter turnout organizations will provide a list of voters to contact and a suggested script to use.


### **New Directory!**

The Spirituality Book Group will meet at Dianne Zupunski's home on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>March 17</u>, to discuss *The Leavers*, by Lisa Ko. The book received the 2016 PEN/ Bellwether Prize for Fiction, awarded by Barbara Kingsolver to a novel that addresses issues of social justice. It was also a finalist for the National Book Award in 2017 and was described by Ann Patchett as "beautifully written, ambitious, and moving."

*The Leavers* is the story of an undocumented immigrant child adopted by well-meaning white professors after his Chinese mother disappears. It examines issues of borders and belonging, of a boy coming into his own after everything he loves is taken away, and of the adopting mother who must learn how to live with past mistakes.

# No Space For a Compost Pile? Try a Worm Bin!

To set up a worm bin, you'll need: Red wriggler worms, a wide unless from a rabbit or a chicken. and shallow container, bedding, and fruit and vegetable scraps from your kitchen.

The worms: Red wrigglers are recommended because they efficiently process food waste into compost. Regular earthworms and other garden varieties like to burrow deep into the ground and will not survive on the rich organic matter in a worm bin. Red worms are specialized surface dwellers who thrive in very

rich organic matter like food

scraps.



These little red wigglers work for you when you set up a worm bin to do your composting.

Generally, a pound of worms should be able to process 1/4 - 1/2 shrubs. Use as top-dressing for lawns: Top-dressing turf propounds of food scraps per day. You can purchase red worms from vides a slow release of nitrogen. Mix finely sifted compost with local or mail order suppliers or get some from a friend's worm bin. sand and sprinkle evenly over the lawn. Feeding your worms: When adding food waste to the bin, pull aside some of the bedding and bury the food. Bury successive loads in different locations in the bin. Feed your worms fruit Most importantly, worms make the most of our food scraps by eat- and vegetable scraps (including citrus peels), coffee grounds greasy or oily foods, breads, grains or dry beans, or pet waste

> Harvest your worm compost: Harvest worm compost from the bottom of the bin after several months or when it looks like soil. For small amounts, look for areas in the bin with soil-like compost and few worms and just grab handfuls. For large quantities, you can push the contents of your bin to one side and fill the empty half with new bedding, food and some of the active worm compost. Add all new food scraps to this new side for a few months. The worms should migrate over there, leaving pure compost on the side with the older material.

> Use as a soil amendment: Mix 2-5 inches of compost into vegetable and flower gardens each year before planting. Use as a potting mixture: Add one part compost to 2 parts commercial potting soil. Use as a mulch: Spread 1-2 inches around annual flowers and vegetables and up to 6 inches around trees and

With inflation continuing to impact people's ability to purchase daily necessities, this is a critical time for those in need around us. Your donations will make a big difference. Get on board and let's see where this train will take us!

# St. Matthew Lutheran Food Pantry

Lutheran Food Pantry provided food and personal hygiene products for more than 12,000 people, including more ALL ARE WELCOME than 4,000 children. This



is an increase of about 20% from 2022 and 60% from 2021. Food insecurity is an increasing problem in our community.

Such work is not possible without the volunteers and donations from St. Andrew Lutheran and other partner congregations that support the pantry. In 2023, volunteers recorded more than 10,000 hours to support the purchase and distribution of food items. The pantry spent \$115,000 to purchase food and hygiene products.

At Christmas, the pantry provided gifts or gift cards to 585 children, which is the largest number to date. These children received a large gift and two smaller gifts. Families were also provided with a game or puzzle, books, and some stocking stuffers.





