### ReFED's 40+ Food Waste Solutions, Part 3

"Reducing Food Waste: Eight Tips for Home Cooks," by Madeline Keating



**Become a storage pro.** Did you know that the best way to store celery is upright in a glass of water on a shelf in your fridge? Or that bananas should not be stored next to other fruits on the counter, and that once ripe, they should be moved to the fridge? Proper storage of food can increase produce lifetime and reduce spoilage. More on this

**The refrigerator demystified:** These tips will help your food stay fresh the longest.

- Keep the temperature at 40°F or less to help food last longer.
  The levers on crisper drawers change the humidity. Set one to high and one to low.
- Keep veggies that tend to wilt in the high-humidity drawer.
- Keep fruits and veggies that tend to break down and rot in the low-humidity drawer.
- The upper shelves are warmer; keep leftovers and drinks there.
- The door is the warmest; don't keep milk and eggs here. Do keep drinks, condiments and butter here.
- Since the lower shelf stays coolest, keep meats and fish here.

**Make friends with your freezer.** The freezer can be a waste-free kitchen's best pal. Freezing produce, meat, dairy, and even lightly beaten eggs is basically like hitting the pause button. The author's favorite foods to freeze are dark leafy greens that are starting to wilt. She simply chops them up, puts them in a plastic (or silicone) bag in the freezer, then uses them by the handful in smoothies, sauces, and curries. More tips: freeze in portions, use airtight containers to reduce freezer burn, and do a survey of what's in the freezer once a month or so.

Revive food that is on its way out. Wilted lettuce, brown bananas, and spoiled milk all create food waste anxiety. But there is hope! Brown bananas? Peel them, freeze them, and use for future smoothies or banana bread. Wilted lettuce? Put it in a bowl of cold water until it gets crisp again. Spoiled milk? Definitely don't drink it, but you can use it instead of buttermilk in baking biscuits or pancakes, add a little to soups or casseroles, or use it in homemade salad dressing.

Understand date labels. When I hear friends and family mention the "expiration" date as the reason that they tossed some food, it makes me cringe. Why? When was the last time you saw a date label that said "expiration date?" Food "expiration" dates have little to do with food



safety; they are not federally regulated and aren't relevant numbers for consumers except in the case of infant formula, which is regulated. Definitely pay attention to dates on infant formula. The date labels "sell by," "use by," or "best before" make their meanings difficult to decipher. Generally, they are indicators of when food will be at its peak quality. My go-to strategy for figuring out if food is still good: If it's been safely stored and I don't see mold, I rely on the sniff or taste test. If it smells and tastes good, I eat it and have never been sorry I did. **Serve food on smaller plates.** Have you noticed that over the years, plates and bowls have gotten a lot bigger than they used to be? The larger the plate, the more likely you are to fill it up, making your eyes bigger than your stomach. Serving food on smaller plates reduces the risk of taking more than you can eat. You can always go back for seconds if the first serving does not meet your needs.

## Final Podcast with Pastor Laurie!




