

Plastic-Free July:

What's Wrong with Using Plastic Anyway?

We've all heard about the huge problem with plastic pollution, how it's in our food, in all the waterways of the world, and even in our bodies. The Great Pacific Garbage Patch is twice the size of Texas, it contains 1.8 billion pieces of floating plastic and kills thousands of marine animals every year. It's so big that it has been nicknamed the "eighth continent."

But what about the manufacturing of plastic? Plastic is just a form of fossil fuel. Your plastic water bottle, your grocery bag, or your foam tray full of meat are made from oil



natural gas. And it takes a lot of energy to make that happen, which adds to the carbon footprint. "'The real story of plastics' impact on the environment begins at the wellheads where it comes out of the ground," says Carroll Muffett, head of the Center for International Environmental Law. "And it never ever stops."

By one estimate, emissions from producing and incinerating plastics could amount to 56 gigatons of carbon between now and 2050. That's almost 50 times the annual emissions of all of the coal power plants in the U.S.

It distresses me to see the ads on TV about the wonders of plastic. The oil companies are seeing the writing on the wall (finally!) as the world begins to move away from combustion-engine vehicles. But, they are adopting a new campaign trying to get people to use more plastic which is made from the oil they extract from the Earth. Ugh! We desperately need those fossil fuels to stay in the ground because of the carbon emitted when it is extracted.

The only thing we as individuals can do about this problem is to use less plastic in the first place. It's true that we still need certain plastics such as that used in medical equipment and our cars, but we can avoid using single-use plastics and try to steer clear of plastic containers.

Throughout July, I will share ideas to reduce or better yet, eliminate, single-use plastics from our lives.

A Note from Myanmar

Steve Claborne writes from Myanmar (formerly Burma), his new posting for Mercy Corps:

"I'm in Yangon (Rangoon), which reminds me of Asia 30 or 40 years ago. Still very underdeveloped. The civil war has set it back even further. Given all the other crises around the world, Palestine, Sudan, Ukraine, Florida, it is long forgotten. People are just getting by day to day. Myanmar is a predominantly Buddhist country, with large Christian and Muslim minorities and hundreds of ethnic groups with their own languages. The long border with Yunnan means the China panda (pooh bear) is ever present, backing whoever is on top at the moment and can safeguard Chinese investments. Your tax dollars are being used to provide basic necessities for people displaced by war."
