Listening Sessions on Worship

With so many creative possibilities, we would like to ground ourselves in the voice of the Holy Spirit and the needs and longing of our congregation. We would love for you to be part of discerning what worship practices would feed the spiritual life of the St. Andrew community in 2024/25.

During the month of August, Pastor Allison is hosting a congregation-wide conversation on this topic. Each Sunday from

11:00 am - 12:00 pm in Fellowship Hall, there will be a Listening Session facilitated by Pr. Allison, which is designed to offer our community a space to reflect, share, and listen to one another. We will discuss questions like:



- What is the most meaningful part of our St. Andrew worship services for you? What impact does it have on you and on your life?
- What do you long for in a worship experience? What would feed your spirit?
- What do you hope the worship service will *do* within you and within our community?
- What assumptions do you carry about how worship should be that might get in the way of listening for where the Holy Spirit is leading our congregation?

The structure of the sessions will be largely the same each week, but you are encouraged to attend multiple sessions so you can connect and converse with as many different people as possible. Please bring an open mind, a willingness to be reflective, and curiosity about the deeper need that underlies both your own worship desires and the desires of others.

5 reasons why I think you should think fantasy football at St. Andrew is cool . . . even if you don't like football:

- ♦ It lasts! Fantasy football is the longest-running intergenerational event at St. Andrew, generating interaction for more than 4 months each season, and we're now entering season seven.
- ♦ The average age of participants last year was ~30 yrs. old.
- ♦ It reaches a wider community. More than half of fantasy football league members do not regularly engage with St. Andrew outside of fantasy football.
- ♦ Four members of the league last year were between 19-23 years old . . . an often overlooked demographic in our church.
- ♦ The Suzanne Warnes Memorial Trophy. Suzanne loved fantasy football, and played in the first 5 years of our league. She passed away during the football season two years ago, and in her final days she arranged for a family member to take over her team for the rest of the season. Last year was the first time someone else got to pick her favorite QB and Oregon Duck, Justin Herbert. This trophy is in her honor and is on display in the Narthex for anyone who would like to see it.

Nifty Notters


Is summer going too fast for you? It is for the Nifty Notters. We only have 3 more meetings after August before the In-Gathering in October.

Vegetables to Plant in August for a Fall Garden Harvest

August may seem like the tail end of the growing season, but it's an ideal time to plant a variety of vegetables that thrive in cooler weather. Fall gardening can be rewarding, providing fresh produce well into autumn. Fresh vegetables are packed with essential vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants that support overall well-being, from boosting immune function to promoting heart health and reducing the risk of chronic diseases.

Gardening is more than just a physical activity; it's a soothing practice that nurtures the spirit. Tending to a garden provides a sense of accomplishment, reduces stress, and connects us with nature, offering a peaceful escape from the hustle and bustle of daily life. Embracing the rhythm of the seasons, especially in the cool, crisp days of fall, can be incredibly rewarding both for the body and the soul.

Spinach is a fast-growing leafy green that loves cool weather. It's perfect for an August planting and will continue to produce well into the fall. Spinach prefers full sun to partial shade, and rich, well-draining soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0.

Lettuce varieties such as Romaine and Butterhead grow quickly and are relatively easy to manage. Lettuce prefers full sun to partial shade, and loose, fertile soil with good drainage and a pH of 6.0 to 6.8.

Radishes are one of the quickest vegetables to mature, often ready for harvest in 3-4 weeks. They add a nice crunch to salads and are great for snacking. Radishes prefer full sun, and loose, well-draining soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0.

Kale is a hardy, leafy green that becomes sweeter after a light frost. It's perfect for a fall harvest and incredibly nutritious. Kale prefers full sun to partial shade, and well-draining soil rich in organic matter, with a pH of 6.0 to 7.5.

Carrots are a root vegetable that stores well, making them a versatile addition to your garden. Carrots prefer full sun, loose, sandy loam soil with good drainage, and a pH of 6.0 to 6.8.

Beets also thrive in cool weather. They can be harvested for their roots and greens, making them doubly beneficial. Beets prefer full sun, and well-drained, sandy loam soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.5.

Broccoli prefers cooler temperatures. This nutrient-packed vegetable is excellent for steaming, roasting, or shredded raw into a salad. Broccoli prefers full sun, and fertile, well-draining soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0.

Swiss Chard is a versatile leafy green that tolerates both heat and cold. It can be continuously harvested throughout the fall. Swiss Chard prefers full sun to partial shade, and well-drained, fertile soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0.

Turnips are a dual-purpose crop, providing both roots and greens. They mature quickly and can withstand cooler temperatures. Turnips prefer full sun, and well-draining soil rich in organic matter with a pH of 5.5 to 6.8.



Tips for a successful fall Garden:

- * Mulching: Mulch is important for maintaining soil health and moisture. It acts as an insulation blanket, keeping the soil warm enough for plants to continue to grow while also maintaining moisture during occasional dry spells during the time of unpredictable weather. Mulch such as straw, leaves, or compost not only protects the roots, but also suppresses weeds that compete for nutrients.
- * Water smart: Cooler weather generally means less evaporation, so you won't need to water as often as you do in summer. However, consistent watering is still essential, especially for young plants. It's better to water deeply less often so the water can reach the roots. Early morning is the best time to water, as it allows the foliage to dry throughout the day, reducing the risk of disease.
- * Be weather-wise: Watch for potential early frosts. Pay attention to the forecast and be prepared to cover your young crops in the evening to trap heat from the soil, then remove the cover in the morning once the air warms up.

Liz Hardy Climate Corner

Vegetables in the Crock Pot

Ingredients:

- ♦ 3 cups baby red potatoes, quartered
- ♦ 3 cups carrots, peeled, cut into chunks
- ♦ 2 cups celery, sliced
- ♦ 3 cups mushrooms, sliced
- ♦ 5 cloves garlic, minced
- Jalapenos, diced, optional
- 1 Tbsp seasoned salt
- ♦ 1 Tbsp oregano
- ♦ 1/2 tsp cayenne pepper, optional
- ♦ 1/4 cup olive oil
- ♦ 2 cups water
- 1. Place all ingredients in a large slow cooker. Mix well, cover and cook on High heat for 4 hours, stirring occasionally.
- 2. Serve as a side dish or freeze for later.

The vegetables used in this recipe are merely suggestions. Feel free to omit or add other veggies: zucchini, squash, bell peppers, beets, corn, peas, beans, brussels sprouts and sweet potatoes are all great. You could also squeeze a bit (or more) of lemon juice to freshen up the veggies.
