# **Matching Gift Challenge**

Remember when area temperatures climbed into the triple digits at the beginning of July? It was that week that the HVAC unit providing climate control for St. Andrew's main suite of church offices died without notice. Since the equipment was installed in the mid-1980s, we weren't surprised. What was surprising, though, was to learn that it



would take 30 – 45 days to secure the county permits necessary to install new HVAC equipment. And the cost to do so is just under \$18,000.

Fortunately, an anonymous donor at St. Andrew has offered \$10,000 in matching funds to augment any gift directed to the cost of replacing this equipment. If you're able to give a little more to help the church rebound from this unexpected cost, please do so – and know that your gift will be doubled with the match that's on offer. # **Safety Plan Task Force**

On Sunday, May 26, Spirit of Grace had an incident in which a young man stood up during the children's sermon, confronted the congregation with teaching false doctrine, and refused to leave. After time and support from several community members, and assistance from three Beaverton police officers, he finally left.

Spirit of Grace Pastor Robyn Hartwig alerted other congregations in the Sunset Cluster, describing the encounter and responses by the congregation and police. The same young man, Chase Grijalva, was later arrested in connection with other incidents in downtown Portland; he is currently in jail on 69 counts, including criminal mischief and unlawful use of a weapon.

The St. Andrew Council voted on July 18 to form a small Safety Plan Task Force to reflect on how we at St. Andrew might prepare to respond to such incidents should they occur here. The task force is charged with:

- 1) crafting a written policy to be included in the Disaster Preparedness Manual, and
- 2) developing training/education for the congregation.

Chaired by Council VP Cindy Stadel, the task force includes Council members Chuck Weswig and Lisa Staul; Worship Committee member Libby Calhoun; and Facilities Committee member Rick Leroy.

We at St. Andrew strive to be a loving and welcoming community of faith in Jesus. We are also called to provide a safe space for all as we break down barriers of isolation. Please hold our congregation and synod—together with the nation as a whole—in prayer as we seek to learn and discern how to be reconciling in Christ in these times of civil disruption.

# **Listening Sessions on Worship**

Dear People of St. Andrew,

I am so happy to be settling into my role as Lead Pastor! I am truly enjoying getting to know this wonderful community through worship, one-on-one conversations, team meetings, and other gatherings. Thank you for your warm welcome and supportive comments during this time!

As you know, St. Andrew's new mission statement identifies praising the Spirit in vibrant worship as one of our primary values. During the call process, the Call Team shared a desire for me to lead the congregation in continuing to explore, exper-



iment, and expand the way we worship to feed the souls of people from a variety of backgrounds. Instead of imposing my own ideas and preferences on the congregation, I would like to begin a congregation-wide conversation about worship that offers the opportunity for us to reflect, share, and listen to one another.

During the month of August, I will be hosting a listening session on worship each Sunday from 11:00 am-12:00 pm in Fellowship Hall. The sessions will include conversations in pairs as well as in the large group, and we will focus on questions like:

- What is the most meaningful part of our St. Andrew worship services for you? What impact does it have on you and on your life?
- What do you long for in a worship experience? What would feed your spirit?
- What do you hope the worship service will \*do\* within you and within our community?
- What assumptions do you carry about how worship should be that might get in the way of listening for where the Holy Spirit is leading our congregation?

The structure of the sessions will be largely the same each week, but I encourage you to attend multiple sessions so you can connect and converse with as many different people as possible.

For many of us, worship inhabits a tender place in our hearts, and it takes courage to share that tenderness with one another. I promise to do my best to create a space where we can all hold one another's hearts with love.

# The Olympics and Climate Change



Many of us have been watching the Olympics recently, some people with a passion for a particular sport or athlete, while others randomly surf TV channels to drop in on a potpourri of

events. This Olympic year, people have also shown interest in the venues being used—is the Seine safe for swimming? Why doesn't the Olympic Village have air conditioning?

That last question opened up a field of inquiry for a couple of BBC reporters (Isabelle Gerretsen and Miriam Quick) who set about comparing conditions from 1924, the last year that Paris hosted the games, to this summer precisely a century later. Athletes were affected by heat 100 years ago, but it's gotten worse.

#### Average Paris temperatures during the period of the summer Olympics have climbed 5.6F since 1924.

Clearly, there's a new game in town. Heat not only diminishes an athlete's ability to perform, but it also changes cognitive function-leading to irritability, difficulty in making complex decisions, decreased mood, reduced motivation, and agitation. Professional athletes participating in outdoor sports must train in sweltering conditions to be competitive while also trying to protect their health.

But there is good news, too. Air pollution in the City of Light is estimated to have been about 110 micrograms per cubic meter in 1924 compared to 19 micrograms today. That's a five-fold reduction, indicating that our decisions and actions truly do impact the world around us.

## **Preparing for Evacuation**

Fires, flooding, landslides, volcanic eruptions. All of these have affected the Pacific Northwest in the past 50 years. In some cases, people have had a day or two to prepare, while other situations require immediate evacuation. If you're ready to go when disaster comes close to home, you'll have some peace of mind.

Here's what you need to do:

- Plan how you'll leave and where you'll go if advised to evacuate.
- 2. Identify several places you could go in an emergency. A friend's home outside your area, a motel. Choose destinations in different directions so you have options.
- 3. If needed, identify a place to stay that will accept pets.
- 4. Be familiar with alternate routes and other means of transportation out of your area.
- 5. Follow instructions of local officials. Depending on the type of disaster, your route may be on foot.
- 6. Assemble a "go-bag" to carry when you evacuate on foot, by bicycle, or by public transportation. Store larger supplies for traveling in your personal vehicle.

#### **Three Kinds of Emergency Kits**

- Under-Bed Kit (to help you get out of the house if it's damaged)
   Sturdy shoes, heavy gloves, protective eyewear, N95 dust mask, hard hat or bike helmet, flashlight, whistle, HELP/OK sign, neighborhood map, contact list
- 2. Go Bag (survival essentials for 1-2 days)

Every family member or pet needs one customized to individual needs. Water and food, head and face protection, hand and feet protection, medicines and first aid, communication devices, cash (small bills and coins), list of emergency numbers, copy of family emergency plan, personal hygiene kit (including heavy duty trash bags), flashlight and whistle



Evacuation Kit (with supplies and tools to help you survive for 3 days-2 weeks)

This is the larger disaster preparedness kit we're assembling over the course of a year.




