


A Few Words about this Sunday's Prelude



The music being played this morning for the prelude is a Partita by Johannes Pachelbel. The title in German is *Christus, der ist mein Leben*. The hymn in our hymnal to that chorale tune is ELW 539; the hymn text is *Abide, O Dearest Jesus, among Us with Your Grace.* A partita is an extended piece that has a theme (the chorale tune) and many variations on that tune. This particular Partita has 12 variations. The prelude will include the chorale tune and variations 1-6.

Everything You Need to Know About Reusable Coffee Pods

The global rise of single-serve coffee pods has certainly made it easier for coffee lovers to brew a perfect cup. However, the environmental impact of these single-use pods is raising serious concerns. This article examines reusable, refillable, and sustainable coffee pods. Single-use coffee pods, though convenient, contribute to a significant environmental burden. According to a 2021 report by Statista, approximately 60 billion coffee pods are discarded every year, leading to around 198,000 tons of waste, mostly plastic waste. Most are made of non-recyclable plastic and aluminum.

What are reusable coffee pods and how do they work? As the name suggests, they are eco-friendly coffee pods that can be reused multiple times. They are designed to fit various coffee machines, from Nespresso to Keurig. Most are designed with durable materials like stainless steel or BPA-free plastic. They come with a refillable compartment to add your choice of ground coffee. Once filled and closed, the pod is placed into the coffee machine. After brewing, the used coffee grounds are emptied (into your compost or yard debris can) and the pod is cleaned for the next use.

Better taste and freshness: Reusable coffee pods allow you to use freshly ground coffee, which often results in a superior taste compared to pre-packaged coffee in single-use pods. Freshly ground coffee beans retain their flavor and aroma much longer, enhancing your coffee-drinking experience. And you can try different blends and origins of your coffee. You can choose ethically-sourced and fair-trade coffee, supporting ethical farming practices and fair payment for coffee growers worldwide.

Cost: While the initial investment in reusable coffee pods may be higher than a box of single-use pods, the long-term savings are significant. Reusable pods are designed to last for years, and ground coffee or coffee beans are often cheaper than their pre-packaged counterparts.



Top 2 Brands:

- SealPod: Made from stainless steel; compatible with several coffee machines including Keurig, Nespresso, and Dolce Gusto; dishwasher safe.
- WayCap: Made in Italy of stainless steel; designed for Nespresso coffee machines; comes with interchangeable filters that allow you to customize the taste of your coffee; dishwasher safe.

Recycling and disposal options for single-use coffee pods: For those who still have single-use pods, there are now brands that offer recycling programs. According to a recent Earth 911 article, Nespresso offers a mail-in program and drop-off locations for their used pods. The company will provide pre-paid recycling bags for customers who purchase pods on its site. The bags hold 75-150 pods, and once the bag is full, you can drop it off at a UPS location or drop box. The company then separates the aluminum from the coffee grounds; the aluminum is recycled and the grounds are composted.

I also found this: While Keurig claims that their coffee pods are recyclable, a recent NPR/OPB report says that "Keurig has agreed to pay \$1.5 million in penalties after the Securities and Exchange Commission charged the company with making misleading statements about how recyclable its popular K-Cup single-use coffee pods are."
