- Plastic screw-on and pull-off caps
- Clear (no color) #1 PET plastic
- #2 HDPE plastic
- #4 LDPE plastic
- #5 PP plastic
- #6 PS plastic
- Styrofoam

Items must be sorted into the above categories. And please note:

- Lids (such as yogurt or sour cream lids) need to be sorted by number
- Screw-on caps do not need to be sorted by number
- Caps MUST be taken off of prescription pill bottles

Why You Should Leave the Leaves for Wildlife

As the leaves turn crimson and begin to fall, many of us feel the urge to tidy up our yards. But consider this: leaving the leaves benefits both your yard and the wildlife that calls it home. Here are reasons to retire the rake this fall.

Leaf litter is a natural habitat and winter refuge: Fallen leaves provide habitat for a variety of wildlife species, creating a protective blanket that insulates them from cold weather, and offering shelter and a winter home for many creatures.

- Insects: Many insects overwinter in leaf litter, including moths, butterflies, and bees. These insects are vital pollinators and a critical food source for birds and other animals. Some butterfly larvae, including Monarchs, use the layer as a safe haven during their dormant phase.
- Amphibians and reptiles: Salamanders, frogs, and toads rely on leaf litter for shelter and moisture.
- Small mammals: Chipmunks, shrews, and mice use leaf litter for nesting and foraging.

Protecting pollinators: Leaving the leaves allows caterpillars and other pollinators to overwinter safely in your yard. Many moth and butterfly species depend on a leaf layer to protect their eggs or cocoons through the cold months. In the case of moths, an astonishing 94% of species rely on the leaf layer to complete their life cycle. Remember that we need moths and butterflies for pollinating our plants.

Supporting birds and other wildlife: Fallen

leaves also help sustain bird populations by fostering insects that birds rely on for food. The vast majority of our backyard birds (about 96%) rely on butterfly and moth caterpillars as the primary food source for their babies during nesting season in the spring. If you remove all of your fallen leaves, there will be fewer insects in your yard, and likely fewer birds too. Some songbirds like Black-Capped Chickadees search through the leaf litter for seeds, insects, and larvae to survive during the cold winter months when food sources are scarce.

Better for the environment and your garden: According to the EPA, leaves and other yard debris account for 35.4 million tons of waste per year in the US! That is about 12.1% of all solid waste in the country. And remember that yard waste in landfills creates methane gas, contributing to global warming. Methane from landfills pollutes the air we breathe, and can make its way into the ground, polluting our soil and water.

Simply leaving the fallen leaves in your yard helps the environment by:

- Improving soil health. As leaves decompose, they add nutrients to the soil such as nitrogen, and improve the soil structure, creating a richer soil for your plants when spring arrives.
- Reducing waste. Leaves and yard debris make up a significant portion of waste in landfills.
- Conserving water. Leaf litter helps to retain moisture in the soil, reducing the need for watering.

In addition, leaves can be used around trees, flower beds, and shrubs as a natural mulch. Why buy mulch that comes in plastic bags when you have free mulch and fertilizer provided by nature? You save money, help your garden thrive, protect pollinators, support the environment, protect plants, and suppress weeds.

<u>A word about slippery driveways and sidewalks</u>: Leaves on your driveway and sidewalks can be slippery, so of course, you need to remove those leaves. But don't put them in the trash. Instead, transfer them to your garden beds and under trees to create habitat for wildlife.

Committee Updates and Transitions

After a community organizing hiatus during the pandemic, several members of the former MACG (Metropolitan Alliance for Common Good) Core Team are turning from providing opportunities for connection in our church community to once again doing the work of community organizing.



Pastor Allison, Pat Christiansen, Larry Bliesner, Lynn Santelmann, and others invite those interested in working on broad-based issues such as affordable housing and access to health care to join them on the MACG/Organizing Core Team.

In past years, community organizers from around the region have come together to address traffic and pedestrian safety in the area. They also succeeded in requiring prescription drug labels in Oregon to be printed in languages patients know. This year's focus will be climate justice, especially when it impacts our most vulnerable populations more than others.

Meanwhile, a new Connections Team at St. Andrew will shift its purview from planning events to encouraging connections. This committee will work to foster connections among people and groups, organize an annual Ministry Fair, encourage links between committees, help identify people to share their talents in ministry, promote additional connections for the homebound, strengthen connections across generations, and take on the joyful work of welcoming people to St. Andrew. Connie Losk, Jan Smith, Gretchen Bancroft, and Sonya Ackman invite others to join them!

Connections are integral to community. Whether we build social connections to strengthen our church community or broader connections to bring about societal change, we need each other. - Organizing and leading listening campaigns,
- Developing internal or neighborhoodfocused campaigns,
- Identification of leaders/potential leaders
- Applying organizing disciplines and practices.
 - 1. Shared leadership,
 - 2. Starting and ending meetings on time,
 - 3. Reflection and evaluation, and
 - 4. Enforcing standards (accountability).

Free Electric Wheelchair

As you may have noticed in Fellowship Hall, St. Andrew was gifted two electric wheelchairs, and now it's up to us to find a permanent home for them! Do you know someone who could use one? What about you reading this article now? We have already had a parishioner request one of the electric wheelchairs. That leaves us with one still needing to find a new home.

We are not asking for any payment for this electric wheelchair. It is free to anyone who is in need of it. For you to take advantage of this opportunity all that we ask is that you are able to organize your receipt of this wheelchair. You can notify the church office of your interest in having one, and let us know what day you or the people you designate would be able to pick it up. This is a rather heavy piece of equipment, weighing a few hundred pounds, so you will need to make appropriate considerations.

If we are not able to find a new owner for this device soon, we may have to make the difficult decision to just dispose of this important mobility aid.
