# Nourishing Conversations: Plant-Based, Whole Food Potluck

Over the last few weeks, we've gathered together on Monday nights for a time of education and fellowship around the preparation and enjoyment of plant-based, whole food cooking. "Nourishing Conversations," an adult education experience with Parish Nurse Tira Nesset, continues this **Monday, January 27**, with the opportunity for us to take what we've learned in the previous weeks and make our own plant-based, whole food options to bring for this week's potluck!

People begin gathering in the kitchen and Fellowship Hall about 5:00 pm to set the tables, make last-minute food preparations, and get to know each other. If you're unable to arrive that early, that's not a problem. Nearing 6:00 pm, we join hands to sing the table blessing and then we eat and talk together. Participants are expected to stick around to assist with cleanup afterwards, providing even more time for fellowship.



Attendees can sign-up on the sheet in the Narthex to help with meal-planning. Participants who intend to bring a dish should notify Tira in advance so that she can be aware and ensure there will be enough food for everyone. One of the benefits of plant-based meals is that they are generally much cheaper to prepare, but we still hope participants will donate toward the cost of the food. A free-will offering bowl makes it easy to chip in—and anything over and above the total cost of the food will be donated to St. Andrew's Lenten Food Drive.

#### A Few Points of Climate Optimism

While you may have thought there is no hope for the climate future, these are just a few reasons for hope that I found. And there are many more! Unfortunately, good news does not seem to be reported as readily as bad news.

California is spending \$20 million to put solar panels over canals, an approach with the potential to cut evaporation by 82% and boost panel efficiency by up to 15%. According to a University of California study, covering all of the irrigation canals in California with solar panels would save enough water from evaporation to supply 2 million people or irrigate 50,000 acres of farmland. It would also save space and preserve fragile desert ecosystems. Drought is a persistent problem, but these "floatovoltaics" offer a win-win-win solution.

In 2024, for the first time ever, wind and solar combined generated more electricity than coal in the USA, as renewables continue to surge and coal plants retire. And a magnificent 96% of new electricity-generating capacity built in the US in 2024 was carbon emissions-free! World-transforming solar accounted for the lion's share at 60% with a record-high 34 GW (34,000 MW) built, with remaining sources including batteries 23%, wind 10%, and nuclear 2%. Excellent progress!

NASA recently published new satellite imagery of China's ever-expanding "Great Solar Wall" energy fields, currently consisting of over 5.4 GW (5,400 MW) of solar capacity in the Kubuqi Desert of Inner Mongolia. The Kubuqi region is a flat, sunny, and desolate area relatively close to major cities that is ideally located for solar power. Plans are to host 100 GW of solar there by 2030. And NASA reports that building these solar farms will likely slow desertification, preventing dune movement and encouraging grass growth. The Solar Age continues to accelerate, with more and more large-scale solar farms bringing a cornucopia of benefits to global decarbonization as well as local economies and ecosystems! Solar farms are a giant win-win-win for clean air, energy abundance, and national security.

Wind power in Texas, a portion of total energy in Texas, consists of over 150 wind farms, which together have a total nameplate capacity of over 30,000 MW (as of 2020). If Texas were a country, it would rank fifth in the world in wind power; the installed wind capacity in Texas exceeds installed wind capacity in all countries but China, the United States, Germany, and India.



There are promising results from early solar vineyards (a form of agrivoltaics) in Italy, with grapes grown under solar panels providing 20-60% higher yields. Now more data on solar vineyards has come in, this time from 2 pilot sites in France run by agrivoltaics pioneer, Sun'Agri, where the grape yields were (like in Italy) 20-60% higher. The presence of the protective solar canopies "optimized the microclimate" by increasing humidity in the immediate area and protecting the grapes against extreme temperatures. Irrigation needs fell by 20-70%, and the plant mortality rate from frost dropped by 25-50%!





According to worldwildlife.org, many species are making a comeback including the Greater One-Horned Rhino in India, Humpback Whales in several of the World's oceans, Mountain Gorillas in

Uganda and the Congo, Black-Footed Ferrets in the Northern Great Plains, Swift Foxes in the grasslands of the Fort Belknap Indian Reservation in Montana, and more!
