Stocking Our Disaster Kits Month Nine, February 2025

Nine months into a year-long effort to prepare for possible disaster, we're still collecting supplies for our households. This month, we also consider what we can do to protect ourselves in earthquake country.

To Do:

- ☐ Arrange for a friend or neighbor to help your children, special needs family members, or pets if you are not able to respond.
- □ Volunteer with a local disaster/emergency group (Portland NET, Red Cross, Medical Reserve Corps).

To Collect:

- ☐ 1 gallon juice*
- □ 3 cans fruit*
- □ Garbage bags
- □ Paper cups
- □ Blanket or sleeping bag*
- ☐ Change of clothing and sturdy footwear*
- * For everything followed by an asterisk, be sure to multiply by the number of people in your household (e.g., a family of four people will need 4 blankets or sleeping bags).




Living on Moving Ground

We're blessed to live in one of the most beautiful parts of the country, but the geologic forces that produced high mountains, a rugged coastline, and dramatic vistas, also make Oregon one of the most earthquake-prone spots in the continental U.S. We fear "the big one" expected to top 9 on the Richter Scale, but know that even smaller quakes have the potential to do a lot of damage. How well we're able to get through an earthquake depends on what we know and how we prepare.

Get prepared now by: 1) Identifying and mitigating hazards; 2) Readying supplies; 3) Developing an emergency plan; and 4) Testing and practicing your plan.

Relative Risk Along the Fault 1. Shaking can collapse poorly



- built structures, but even if your home was built before seismic design requirements were instituted in the 1970s, you can take action. The most likely result of the ground shaking is injury by falling items in your home or place of business. Lights, television sets, bookshelves, stuff in your cupboards, can topple, but some of these things can be secured to the wall. And, if you have the resources, your home can be retrofitted for more protection.
- 2. Readying supplies is what we've been doing gradually month by month. Keep it up!
- 3. We've also worked on developing emergency plans. In case of an earthquake, though, the first thing we need to do is DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON. Because seconds matter, we need to act immediately! Before grabbing your Go Kit, take cover!
- 4. Conduct an earthquake drill, creating an earthquake scenario and acting out your plan. Are there weak points you should address? Adjust your plan as needed.

In the past week (from January 24-January 31, 2025) the PNW has experienced more than 100 small quakes, plus six larger ones. The Juan de Fuca oceanic plate is being pulled under North America, moving about an inch each year. It's along this Cascadia Subduction Zone that 40 great earthquakes have occurred in known history, the last one in 1700. Geologists estimate these big events occur irregularly every 200-800 years.

Dear People of St. Andrew,

In 2011, St. Andrew took a leap of faith to build a fellowship and education wing to replace our old Fellowship Hall. Your generous giving has allowed St. Andrew to meet monthly payments on this multimillion-dollar debt, as well as make additional principle payments. Today, we can "see the light at the end of the tunnel" and will soon celebrate the burning of the mortgage!

We now feel it is appropriate to turn our stewardship attention from the mortgage to the Ministry and Mission Operating Fund. This is the fund that supports the day-to-day operations of our church. Through this fund, we compensate our employees, pay the bills, and purchase all the material resources needed to carry out our vital ministries of worship, pastoral care, Christian formation, service, and justice work. This fund makes our ministry possible.

On February 2nd, we will kick off a Stewardship Season at St. Andrew that is focused on the Ministry and Mission Operating Fund. Increased offerings to this fund will allow us to:

- Support a New Minister of Music
- Sustain Vital Ministry
- Save for the ELCA National Youth Gathering

Throughout the month of February, you will receive information via mail, email, and during worship services about these three areas and the ways we as a congregation can grow in generosity in order to successfully achieve our goals.

Our Stewardship Season will conclude on March 2nd, which we are calling Generosity Sunday. On that day, members and friends of the congregation will be invited to submit intent cards indicating the amount they intend to contribute to the Ministry and Mission Operating Fund in 2025. These intent cards will be mailed to you in February, and once submitted, they will greatly assist the Church Council in financial planning.

We invite you to join us in praying for the congregation and discerning how each of us might grow in generosity this year. Thank you in advance for your ongoing support of St. Andrew as we live out our commitment to Christ in our lives, and in our community.
