Celebrating the Work of 2024: Living Our Mission

Service Committee

In 2024, the Service Committee exemplified St. Andrew's commitment to Neighbor and Community Care, donating \$8,500 – 1.5% of our Ministry and Mission funds—to local nonprofits tackling hunger, housing instability, domestic violence, and poverty. The committee also led special initiatives such as the Lenten Food Drive, Thanksgiving Meals, the Barnes School Christmas Giving Tree, and more, relying on the generosity of our congregation to support these impactful efforts. Through these projects, we continue to extend God's love to our community in meaningful ways.

Earth Care Team

In 2024, the Earth Care Team exemplified stewardship of creation through impactful efforts like restoring habitats on St. Andrew's property and achieving Backyard Habitat certification. They educated and inspired action through the Earth Care Fair, Earth Camp, and weekly updates, while also advocating for environmental change by participating in the Oregon Synod Climate Resilience cohort and working with local officials to promote sustainable practices. Their work reminds us of our responsibility to care for God's creation in both personal and communal ways.

Turn Temp of Water Heater Down

The following information is from Energy Star: Water heating is the second largest energy expense in your home at 15% or more of your utility bill, depending on the temperature at which it is set. Take a few minutes to lower your water heater temperature setting and you can save both energy and money!



Most water heater manufacturers set their temperature to 140°F by default. However, 120°F is generally hot enough and safe for most residential uses. Water heated to 140°F not only wastes energy, but it also poses a serious scalding hazard. Trust me, I've taken care of plenty of scalded patients, especially children and the elderly.

Lowering your water heater temperature from 140°F to 120°F is one of the easiest ways to increase your home's energy efficiency and save money. It's free, simple, and can be done in just a few minutes! I have mine turned down to 110° which is plenty warm for showers. I wash my clothes in cold water anyway, as do most of us on the Earth Care Team and our clothes get just as clean!

Check your dishwasher for a built-in heat booster. In order to clean and sterilize dishes effectively, dishwashers require a water temperature of 130-140°F. Most dishwasher models come with built-in heat boosters to raise the heat coming from your water heater and achieve this temperature. It's a shame to keep an entire water heater constantly set at 140°F in order to run the dishwasher a few times a week. Before you lower your water heater temperature, check your dishwasher manual to make sure your model has a heat booster.

Lowering the temperature will also extend the life of your water heater by slowing corrosion and mineral buildup in your unit and pipes. Since water heaters consume 15% or more on average of your home's energy bill, this is an easy way to save energy and money and can reduce both carbon emissions and air pollution
