Lenten Food Train Begins Its Journey



The engine is revved up and ready to begin hauling boxcars of food and hygiene products destined for the St. Matthew food bank. Beginning <u>Sunday</u>, <u>March 9</u>, and continuing throughout Lent, we hope to fill multiple boxes of food to feed the hungry and help the needy in our community.

The train will begin in the Sanctuary and as we add boxcars it will wind its way around the church. Please bring your non-perishable food items (such as spaghetti and spaghetti sauces, canned corn, white sugar, rice, beans, etc.), as well as hygiene products (shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, deodorant, etc.) to fill the boxcars.

If you prefer to donate money instead, please write a check with Lenten Food Drive on the memo line or donate online, selecting Lenten Food Drive from the drop-down menu on the church website. A new boxcar will be added with every \$250 added to the fund.

As inflation continues to impact the ability to purchase food and other necessities, this is a critical time for those living on the edge. Your donations could make their lives less stressful.

Take-home ashes will be available in the Narthex this <u>Sunday</u>, <u>March 2</u>. These bags are for those who are unable to attend Ash Wednesday services on March 5 and allow them to have the ashes for themselves and family members. Each bag holds a container of ashes, a liturgy for using the ashes on Ash Wednesday, and daily prayer cards that follow our Sunday theme for Lent, "Everything in Between."

In 2024, St. Andrew's next generational ministries flourished, nurturing faith and community in remarkable ways. Eight high school students and three adult chaperones proudly represented our congregation at the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans, an unforgettable experience of worship, service, and connection. We celebrated milestones in our young people's faith journeys as we graduated three high school seniors, gifting them handmade quilts to remind them of our love and prayers. Middle schoolers deepened their understanding of faith during a beach retreat in Seaside, where they crafted their statements of faith, and two eighth graders affirmed their baptism through confirmation. The Roots children's program remained a hub of creativity and spirituality, with teachers and volunteers fostering faith formation in innovative and loving ways. Earth Camp welcomed 40 children, inspiring them to care for creation as an expression of God's love. In addition, the Andy's Room Podcast debuted as a fresh platform for the younger voices of St. Andrew. Through thoughtful conversations, our youth explored what faith and church mean for their generation, paving the way for a vibrant future.



Things Seen and Unseen by Nora Gallagher

This is a lovely, thoughtful book, like going to church, being in church, and all the peace and the prayers that surround it. I loved it. It was like being on Council without making any decisions and being part of a warm and friendly group without having to share.

The author is "up there" in responsibility in the church, but she is not the pastor, sort of a lay leader. This is an Episcopal Church so they do things a bit different, which is both interesting and familiar because they are much like us. Starting with Advent, Gallagher goes through the entire church year with all its joys and sorrows, conflicts and choices, and meetings, meetings!



It's good to read about someone else's conflicts as a church, many of which we have battled through ourselves, and some we may yet get to. They have a gay pastor to call—or not, a soup kitchen that runs really well, but some people don't like it anyway, and a labyrinth that people aren't sure about either. And they have the leaving and the dying, which are as hard for them as they are for us.

Gallagher writes in thoughts rather than a true story line, but it makes for a light touch. The book offers a contemplative walk through someone else's church year that may refresh or give you rest about your own. Sit and watch it all unfold.

Include enough food, water, and medical supplies to prepare in case of an emergency.



Create a Disaster Preparedness Kit Month Ten, March 2025

To Do:

- ☐ Make a smaller kit for your vehicle.
- ☐ Purchase and install an emergency escape ladder for upper story windows.

To Collect:

- ☐ Toothbrushes* / toothpaste
- □ Hammer
- □ Screwdriver
- □ Pliers
- □ Assorted nails and screws
- * For everything followed by an asterisk, be sure to multiply by the number of people in your household (e.g., a family of four will need 4 toothbrushes).

How to Prepare for a Power Outage

Power outages are the most frequent weather-related issue complicating our lives. They can happen during winter storms, floods, windstorms, and wildfires, if there's an issue with the power equipment, or even if wildlife interrupt the electrical grid.

Squirrels are the worst wildlife offenders, earning their own acronym in the industry, POCBS – power outages caused by squirrels. It sounds laughable, until you learn that in the U.S. as of 2017, there have been six deaths associated with squirrel interference.



It's important to be aware that power loss can be more than inconvenient; it can cause real harm if we're uninformed and unprepared.

Ways to Prepare Ahead of Time

- If you use any medical devices that need power, talk to your medical device provider about backup power sources.
- Consult your pharmacist about what to do with refrigerated medications.
- Keep a flashlight for each person in your home.
- Stock up on water and nonperishable food.
- Install a carbon monoxide detector on every floor of your home and keep extra batteries on hand. Test detectors regularly.
- Have a cooler and frozen ice packs available just in case.

During the Power Outage

- Keep meat, poultry, fish, and eggs at or below 40°F and frozen food at or below 0°F. Keep freezer and refrigerator doors closed as much as possible. Unopened, a refrigerator will keep food cold for 4 hours, and a freezer for 48 hours. Use a food thermometer to check food before cooking and throw away any food that has a temperature of more than 40°F.
- Do NOT use a gas stove or oven to heat your home. This can cause a buildup of carbon monoxide, which can be fatal.
- If you use a generator, camp stove, or charcoal grill to stay warm, do so outdoors at least 25 feet away from windows and vents to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
 - 1. Keep fuel at least 25 feet from windows as well.
 - 2. Keep generator dry. Touching a wet generator could cause an electrical shock.
 - 3. If you need to refuel, let the generator cool first. Fuel that spills on hot engine parts could catch fire.

Never connect a standby generator into your home's electrical system. Set up and run your generator outside the home away from garage doors, windows and vents. Start the generator before connecting appliances. Use a heavy-duty extension cord to connect appliances directly into the generator's outlet. Source: SafeElectricity.org
