#### The 2025 Super Bible Bowl Is in the Books!



# Celebrating the Work of 2024: Living Our Mission

In this Stewardship season, we take time to reflect on the many ways St. Andrew's ministries have flourished over the past year. From caring for our neighbors to deepening our worship and expanding community connections, these efforts reflect our shared commitment to faith in action.



Throughout this season we will highlight the work of different teams, celebrating their achievements in 2024 and looking ahead to the ways they will continue to serve in 2025. We give thanks for all who contribute their time, energy, and gifts to sustain and strengthen our congregation's mission.

#### Sanctuary Team

In 2023-24, the Sanctuary Team remained steadfast in its support for the Malik Zada family of six who relocated from Afghanistan in August 2022. Beyond assisting with the family's ongoing needs, the team successfully developed and delivered the *Sanctuary in Our Time and Place* adult education series, fostering a deeper understanding of sanctuary work and its relevance today. This team's dedication exemplifies the power of community support and advocacy, ensuring that the family continues to thrive in their new home.

#### **Organizing Core Team**

In 2024, the Organizing Core Team played a pivotal role in fostering relational connections both within St. Andrew and in the wider community. From hosting board game nights to organizing the Ministry Fair, which highlighted St. Andrew's vibrant ministries, the team encouraged deeper engagement and participation. September brought the team to the MACG Delegate Assembly where community organizing efforts were the focus. The team further enriched their knowledge through the *Wrestling With the Truth of Colonization* class. The team's latest effort was a neighborhood canvassing event, conducted alongside the Earth Care Team, aimed at building stronger, more resilient communities in the face of climate disruptions. Their ongoing work continues to create a sense of solidarity and action across our church and beyond.

#### What to Do with You Wine Corks

Got a collection of wine corks gathering on a kitchen counter? It's OK—we all do it. You pop open a bottle of wine, keep the cork for some reason, and soon there's a whole jar of wine corks and you're wondering what to do with them. The answer is get crafty! There are also ways to recycle them.

#### Wine cork crafts:

- ◆ Glue corks to a piece of plywood to create a unique, three-dimensional work of art for your kitchen or dining room.
- Cover a monogram cut-out with corks for a personalized addition to your home.
- Add a ring of corks around the outside edge of a candleholder.
- ♦ Make a trivet by securing corks inside a hose clamp or an embroidery hoop.
- Having friends over for wine and snacks? Craft a wine cork wreath to hang on the front door by gluing corks to a wreath form and add ribbon.
- ◆ Cut corks into slices, decorate them with calligraphy or stamps or whatever, and add wire to make wine glass charms that help guests keep track of which glass is theirs. Use the same technique to make jewelry pendants.
- Repurpose an old picture frame by gluing corks onto the area where the picture was to make a bulletin board.
- Make weather resistant garden markers. Write the plant name on the cork and place the cork on a skewer.
- Make a bath mat. Cork is antimicrobial, antibacterial, hypoallergenic, and is mildew resistant. Use a hot glue gun to attach the corks to a non-slip backing, or tightly pack the corks into a wooden frame such as an old shadow box.

**Recycle cork**: Cork is used to make things such as handbags and the soles of shoes. Industry uses it for such things as insulation, sound-proofing, flooring, furniture, and more.

Scrap Creative Reuse at 1736 SW Alder St. in Portland takes corks. They have a large bin of corks, so apparently many people recycle their corks there! Some wineries take corks as well. Or you can bring them to me at church and I will put them in my Ridwell box, easy peasy!

#### A Few More Words about The Last Sunday

"The church is only the church when it exists for others...not dominating, but helping and serving." -Dietrich Bonhoeffer

On the last Sunday of January, I attended the first meeting of The Last Sunday, a gathering of younger (16 - 50 year-old) people meant to build community and encouragement in our current political climate. It sets out to confront what it calls "supremacist Christianity" or "toxic Christianity" in modern America, and I found a fairly diverse group of people in attendance: St. Andrew members and friends, people from other congregations, as well as people who do not currently practice religion but have in the past—all individuals who love the message of Christ and yearn for the Church to follow Jesus more closely. I commend Kyler Vogt and Forrest Nameniuk (the cocreators) for all their work to ensure that the time we spent together was thoughtful, compassionate, and in good faith.

After a casual meal together, we engaged in prayer, readings, and a short meditation on the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and his relationship with the white churches of America. The rest of our time was spent in conversation pairs where we talked about the things that anger us, that offer us hope, and that hold us back from doing more to bring about change. After sharing our conclusions with the group as a whole, we ended with prayer and cleaned up before setting out.

I went to find commiseration for my troubles, and found something more—hope. I saw that others are aware of the flaws in our human institutions, and that others, like me, believe that these institutions can (and MUST) change. It was an empowering experience that challenged me to think and pray further about how I can act for change in the Church and in the world around me. I recommend that anyone 50 and under attend one of these gatherings. We are not only the future of the Church, we are its present, and we are its leaders just as much as anyone else.
