Reading

Luke 19:1-10

As we hear the account of Jesus' encounter with Zacchaeus, consider the way in which the desire to see and the willingness to see unexpected things play out in this story.

A reading from Luke.

¹Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through it. ²A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. ³He was trying to see who lesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. ⁴So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. ⁵When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down, for I must stay at your house today." 'So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. ⁷All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." ⁸Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." ⁹Then Jesus said to him, "Todav salvation has come to this house, because he, too, is a son of Abraham. ¹⁰For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."

In the sound of the candle's flame crackling, we hear the dance of God's love, which we are invited to join.

May the light, warmth, scent, flavor, and sound of our candles lead us deeper into the love of God today and always. **Amen.**
