GATHERING LITANY

For these forty days, we journey with Jesus down the Lenten path. As we gather, we seek to experience the ways Christ's embodied life demonstrates God's love for us.

We come with hearts open to learn.

We will listen to stories of Jesus' life and of God's people, because they teach us how God calls us to live in the world.

We come to learn from the stories of God's ancient people, Christ's life, and the church.

We will engage through our senses with the power and mystery of the world God made, because this exploration calls us into wonder.

We come to learn through the gifts of our senses.

We will light candles to remind each other of the fullness of Christ's presence with us in our worship and in our world.

We come to learn how to better see and reflect the light of Christ.

We will pray as Jesus taught us and send each other back into daily life with a deeper connection to the life and love of Jesus.

We come to learn how to live more fully in the embodied image of God.

OPENING PRAYER

God incarnate,

you have given us a sense of smell to breathe in awareness of the world around us and to connect with our own memories. Open our minds and our hearts to receive the gifts you have for us, and teach us to share these gifts with the world. Amen.

Reading

As we listen to the story of a gift of love and preparation, notice the description of how the scent of the perfume fills the room. Consider how this sensory description underlays and amplifies the heavy emotions at play in this scene.

A reading from John.

¹Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ²There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those reclining with him. ³Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus's feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, ⁵"Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" ⁶(He said this not because he cared about the poor but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) ⁷Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She

bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."

MEDITATION STATIONS

Thanksgiving for the Embodied God

God has created and blessed us. In Jesus, God has joined us in the experience of embodied life as an expression of God's own love and joy. Through exploration of our own physical senses we are invited to know God in new ways.

In thanksgiving for the gift of incarnation, we light our candles.

Pause for the sharing of the light.

Through the beauty of the candle's light, we see the brightness of God's love shining in every darkness.

Through the warmth of the candle's heat, we feel the strength of God's love burning through all obstacles.

In the scent of the candle's wax, we remember the promise that our prayers rise up as incense to God.

In the flavor of the candle's smoke on our breath, we taste the persistence of God's love, surviving the flames and taking new form. In the sound of the candle's flame crackling, we hear the dance of God's love, which we are invited to join.

May the light, warmth, scent, flavor, and sound of our candles lead us deeper into the love of God today and always. **Amen.**
