Lenten Food Train Begins Its Journey

The engine is revved up and ready to begin hauling boxcars of food and hygiene products destined for the St. Matthew food bank. Beginning this <u>Sunday</u>, <u>March 9</u>, and continuing throughout Lent, we hope to fill multiple boxes of food to feed the hungry and help the needy in our community.

The train will begin in the Narthex and as we add boxcars it will wind its way around the church. Please bring your non-perishable food items (such as spaghetti and spaghetti sauces, canned corn, white sugar, rice, beans, etc.) as well as hygiene products (shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, deodorant, etc.) to fill the boxcars.



If you prefer to donate money instead, please write a check with Lenten Food Drive on the memo line or donate online, selecting Lenten Food Drive from the drop-down menu on the church website. A new boxcar will be added for every \$250 given to the fund.

As inflation continues to impact the ability to purchase food and other necessities, this is a critical time for those living on the margins. Your donations could make their lives a little less stressful.

Some Unexpected Things You Can Compost

Composting is the best way to get rid of your kitchen scraps without sending them to the landfill where they create much of the methane gas that is heating up the planet. But there are other items that you don't usually see on a list of compostables.



If you're like me, you have already experimented with some of these. If you wonder if an item will decompose in your compost, just try a small sample and see if it disappears. Remember that compost needs brown as well as green ingredients, and paper, bamboo, and wood provide that brown ingredient.

Not all compost piles are the same. Compost acts differently in different climates and in different structures such as a bin in contact with the ground versus a rolling bin versus a true compost pile. Your compost may not get as hot or as much air as your neighbor's bin.

Price tags: As long as the tag is paper without plasticization, it can go in the compost. These tiny papers are too small to be recycled curbside. But in compost, they will decompose just like shredded paper, and add to the brown ingredients.

Shredded paper: Loose shredded paper should not go into the curbside recycle bin as it is too small and can tangle up the recycling machinery. You can put it in the curbside bin if it is in a paper bag. But allowing the worms to eat it in your compost is the most secure way to dispose of sensitive documents! And it adds brown to your compost.

Tea, paper wrappers, tags, and the bag: The tea itself is very compostable. So are paper wrappers, as long as they are not lined with foil or plastic. If the bag is made of cotton or filter paper, the string is cotton and the tag is paper, it can go into the compost. However, if the bag is made of nylon, it will not decompose in a compost pile. And by the way, coffee and coffee filters are also compostable.

Bamboo skewers, wooden chopsticks, toothpicks, and matchsticks: These small disposable, single-use wooden kitchen tools can all be composted. (You can also run the chopsticks through the dishwasher and reuse them.)

Tissue paper: Tissue paper cannot go into the curbside bin because its low-quality paper fibers can't be used again. But it does very well in your compost. Again, it adds the brown component to the compost.

Kitchen single-use paper products: While single-use products are not encouraged, if you do find yourself having to use them occasionally, know that they are compostable. Examples are paper towel, paper napkins (I use cloth napkins), uncoated paper plates, and bamboo disposable plates. They will decompose faster if you rip them up first.

Spent potting soil: This is one I hadn't thought of. When you repot houseplants or outside pots, adding the old soil to your compost adds nutrients to your compost.
