LWR Spring Ingathering Volunteers

This <u>**Tuesday, April 29**</u>, from 5:00 pm – 7:00 pm in Fellowship Hall, we will be assembling Personal Care Kits and Baby Kits. We will also be packing the kits and quilts made by the Nifty Notters into boxes to prepare them for shipment to LWR. This is a great event for families. See the list to the left for supplies still needed to fill these kits.

We also need volunteers to help with the Ingathering on <u>Friday</u>, <u>May 2</u>, and <u>Saturday</u>, <u>May 3</u>. Volunteers on Friday work in 2-hour shifts beginning at 8:00 am and continuing until 4:00 pm. On Saturday, we need volunteers to fill a single 3-hour shift from 9:00 am to noon.

The Ingathering takes place in the St. Andrew parking lot near the community garden. We have two types of volunteer assignments:

- 1. Load the shipping container with boxes that can weigh up to 40 pounds.
- 2. Greet vehicle drivers as churches drop off their donations.

Avoid Fast Fashion & Make Your Clothes Last

Quality clothing doesn't have to be code for expensive clothing. Well-made clothes aren't determined by the price tag and simple care can make those pieces last, which saves you the hassle and cost of replacing them. You can extend the life of your clothes and your investment by taking a few easy steps:

Step 1: Look for quality

- Fabrics: All types of fabrics, whether natural or synthetic, have advantages and disadvantages. Consider the quality of the fabric itself (thickness, softness, stretchiness, etc.) and how suitable the fabric is for that particular item. Will it be comfortable and durable?
- Good quality thread and strong, even stitches: Give the fabric a gentle pull to see if the thread breaks or pops. Check for rippled, puckered, or twisted hems and seams. Avoid garments that don't appear to hang smoothly.
- Edges and hems: Cut or raw edges and hems can lead to unraveling and loose, hanging threads. Be careful in choosing garments with these features as they may require special laundering.
- Matched patterns: If the garment has stripes or plaid, the pattern should match up at the seams.
- Linings: For suits and other lined garments, check to see if the lining hangs loosely and doesn't cause any pulling or puckering.
- Quality buttons and buttonholes: Buttonholes should be well stitched with no loose threads or raw fabric showing. Test the button in the buttonhole to make sure it's easy to button up the garment.

Step 2: Care for your clothes

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- Clean correctly: Follow labels when washing your clothes to keep them looking better and lasting longer.
- Consider cold water: For most laundry, you can use cold water and less detergent than directed. This prevents exposure to excess heat or chemicals that contribute to fading or wearing out.
- Group similar items and turn inside out: When washing, turn jeans and graphic shirts inside out to prevent fading and wear. Wash similar items together (for example, all jeans) to prevent harsher fabrics from wearing on softer ones.
- Use the dryer sparingly: High heat fades and shrinks material. It also breaks down elastic fibers in clothes, causing breakage and stretching. When possible, line or flat dry your clothes. If you must dry your clothes, use the lowest setting.
- Stain removal: Discover what sort of care is best for the stain. Cold water, hot water, or stain treatment? Some quick online research can save that garment you love.
- Simple fixes: Learn the simple but satisfying art of reattaching a button, mending a tear, or applying a patch.
- Call in the experts: Locate a good dry cleaner and tailor that can help keep your clothes clean and well-fitted. Or look for a repair fair near you as discussed last week!



Step 3: Wear those clothes often and for years to come!

• Every item in your closet has a cost-per-wear: The longer you wear that shirt or pair of jeans, the more you get out of your investment. A closet carefully stocked with several quality items will outlast a closet packed with poorly made, disposable clothes. So choose quality – you'll look good, save money, and help care for our environment.

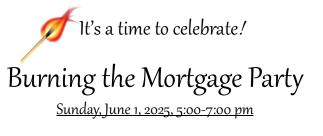

Evacuation Planning Under Way



First things first: Please familiarize yourselves with the color-coded map of the Sanctuary now in the pew racks. Pay particular attention to exits, especially exits accessible to people with disabilities. Think about where you normally sit and how you and those close to you could quickly and safely leave the building.

The Safety Plan Task Force will be conducting an evacuation drill in the near future. Because it will be a first (or the first in a very long time), we expect it to be messy. However, as we go through this initial exercise – clearing the Sanctuary and exiting the building – we expect to learn what works, what does not, and how we can do better.

The need for safety planning was prompted by an event last May at Spirit of Grace Church, when a visitor caused a disturbance and then refused to leave. Several days later that same individual was arrested in downtown Portland and charged with 69 counts, including criminal mischief and unlawful

weather, and more.



use of a weapon. When the incident occurred, Spirit of Grace did not have a response plan and, when 911 was called and police arrived, congregation members stood around talking, making the job of the police more difficult.



Force last July to determine how we at St. Andrew might prepare to respond to an emergency. The task force was charged with developing policy for the Disaster Preparedness Manual and training and education for the congregation. What became clear, as a first step, was the need for an evacuation plan: one that all of us understand and have practiced; one that can be used for any event where there is a need to move people out of the facility due to fire,

bomb threat, active shooter, earthquake, severe

In January, the Council accepted the task force rec-

ommendations, including a policy on safety and formation of an ongoing Safety Team comprised of 8-12 individuals prepared to act quickly and decisively during emergencies (e.g., medical situations, fire alarms, disturbances, etc.). Members of the Safety Team will commit to attending quarterly trainings and practice sessions to stay updated on emergency first aid procedures, de-escalation techniques, and best practices for maintaining a safe environment.



This initial evacuation drill will be the final activity of the task force and will lay the groundwork for the new Safety Team. The goal is to have a Safety Team in place by July 1.
