### Adult Ed: The Loyalty of Ruth & Esther

During the Easter season we are privileged to see the faith and loyalty of women in the gospels. Women were at the cross with Jesus and then shared the news of his resurrection. There are equally devoted women in the Hebrew Bible. Both Ruth and Esther are loyal to their people and do what is in the best interest of their community. Through Ruth and Esther, we will see examples of what it means to be faithful to God and what lessons we can take to improve our own lives of faith.

### What Does It Mean to Be a Lutheran?

What was important about the Protestant Reformation? Can we compare the Lutheran church with other Protestant churches? How is the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America different from other Lutheran denominations? How have people from divergent traditions (Lutheran, Catholic, non-denominational, unchurched, etc.) found their way to the ELCA? What makes St. Andrew unique in its Core Values, Mission, and Vision? And most important: What questions do *you* have about "What does it mean to be a Lutheran?"



This five-week class is for new Lutherans who want to know more about what they signed up for, for long-time Lutherans who need a refresher, and for anyone who is curious about Lutheran faith and practice. Paul Navarre and Steve Christiansen will lead this course on Sundays at 11:00 am in Fellowship Hall.

### **Cool News for Worshipers**

The Facilities Team has some good and glorious news to share with fellow worshipers. At its April meeting, the St. Andrew Council approved our recommendation to upgrade the church's three Sanctuary furnaces to high-efficiency models AND to install air conditioning for our worship space!



Thanks to generous giving, St. Andrew has the resources available in PIPE (Property Improvement Projects & Emergencies), a designated fund, to pay for these improvements. In other words, the church operating budget will not be affected at all, either in the current fiscal year or next.

Because of permitting requirements and supply chain challenges, installation is still a few months away, but expectation is that work should begin in July 2025.

### **Evacuation Planning Under Way**



First things first: Please familiarize yourselves with the color-coded map of the Sanctuary now in the pew racks. Pay particular attention to exits, especially exits accessible to people with disabilities. Think about where you normally sit and how you and those close to you could quickly and safely leave the building.

The Safety Plan Task Force will be conducting an evacuation drill in the near future. Because it will be a first (or the first in a very long time), we expect it to be messy. However, as we go through this initial exercise—clearing the Sanctuary and exiting the building—we expect to learn what works, what does not, and how we can do better.

The need for safety planning was prompted by an event last May at Spirit of Grace Church, when a visitor caused a disturbance and then refused to leave. Several days later that same individual was arrested in downtown Portland and charged with 69 counts, including criminal mischief and unlawful use of a weapon.



When the incident occurred, Spirit of Grace did not have a response plan and, when 911 was called and police arrived, congregation members stood around talking, making the job of the police more difficult.



The St. Andrew Council formed a Safety Plan Task Force last July to determine how we at St. Andrew might prepare to respond to an emergency. The task force was charged with developing policy for the Disaster Preparedness Manual and training and education for the congregation. What became clear, as a first step, was the need for an evacuation plan: one that all of us understand and have practiced; one that can be used for any event where there is a need to move people out of the facility due to fire, bomb threat, active shooter, earthquake, severe weather, and more.



In January, the Council accepted the task force recommendations, including a policy on safety and formation of an ongoing Safety Team comprised of 8-12 individuals prepared to act quickly and decisively during emergencies (e.g., medical situations, fire alarms, disturbances, etc.). Members of the Safety Team will commit to attending quarterly trainings and practice sessions to stay updated on emergency first aid procedures, de-escalation techniques, and best practices for maintaining a safe environment.



This initial evacuation drill will be the final activity of the task force and will lay the groundwork for the new Safety Team. The goal is to have a Safety Team in place by July 1.

We continue to encourage you to bring flowers or plants to fill the Sanctuary with the colors of spring. These may be cut flowers from your garden or market (no highly perfumed flowers such as lilies) or potted plants, either blooming or foliage. 
### **MACG Delegate Assembly Change of Date**

### **Reviewing Our Year to Prepare**

Over the past year, the Earth Care Team has provided monthly inserts in the church newsletter, highlighting what each of us can and should do to prepare for living as well as possible in case of disaster.

Here's what we've covered:

- Managing Illness or Injury During Disaster | Oregon's Good Samaritan Law

- ♦ Preparing for a Power Outage
- Making Water Safe to Drink

Each month, we've shared lists of what to do and what to collect to survive whatever might come. We've provided links to valuable guides and resources. If you'd like to keep a packet of these preparedness pages, pick one up at the Earth Care kiosk in the Narthex.



But please keep in mind that we've barely grazed the surface of the many disaster planning resources available through organizations such as the Oregon Department of Emergency Management, the Red Cross, and Neighbors Ready. Check out federal resources, too, but be aware that some of these, such as the NOAA (the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Ad-

ministration) and FEMA (the Federal Emergency Management Agency) websites are in flux and being updated to comply with President Trump's executive orders.

We recommend printing the Be 2 Weeks Ready Took Kit from the Oregon Department of Emergency Management, where you'll discover alternative cooking methods (page 60), find several forms to



help your disaster planning (pages 51-55), and learn things such as how to track time without a clock or watch (page 69), how to remove water from a water heater (page 71), how to make an emergency washing machine (page 77), and much more.

In recent years, Oregon has experienced floods, drought, wildfires, ice storms, excessive heat, and a pandemic, disasters that illustrate how being prepared can make a big difference. Once a disaster strikes, the time to prepare has passed. Building selfreliance and community connections ahead of time is imperative to being ready for any potential emergency. In Need of Prayers...

Do you receive blue giving envelopes each month by mail, but never use them?
