#### St. Andrew Movie Night: Conclave



#### **Choose Reusable Flatware Instead of Plastic**

Plastic is made from chemicals derived from fossil fuels. Burning those fossil fuels drives the climate crisis by producing planet-warming greenhouse gas emissions such as carbon dioxide and methane. Disposable flatware in particular is typically produced from a rigid plastic called polystyrene, which is made from a byproduct of petroleum.

Plastic contributes to climate change at every stage of its life cycle. Plastic production is warming the planet 4 times faster than air travel. In addition to its climate impact, it is also contributing to air and water pollution during the drilling and fracking process, and toxic emissions that come out of the plastic production plant.

In addition, plastics contribute to environmental injustice, as plastics tend to be both manufactured and disposed of in lower-income communities and communities of color. Plastics pollutants have led to a higher rate of cancer in those areas.

Processing crude oil also requires a significant amount of energy and water. A typical refinery will use about 1.5 barrels of water for each barrel of oil it processes.

And then there is the concern about the use of plastic food containers, plastic dishes, and plastic flatware causing microplastics to reside in you. Studies have found microplastics in human blood, lungs, placentas, brains and testicles. This is concerning because a lot of the chemicals in plastics are associated with cancer, hormone disruption, diabetes, fertility issues, and more. The more we learn, the scarier it gets!

The impact of switching to reusable flatware: Some reports estimate that 36 to 40 billion plastic utensils are used every year just in the US, which is more than 100 million per day. The intentional durability of plastics means that the fork you ate lunch with today could be taking up space in the landfill 500 years from now!

In landfills, plastic utensils are weakened by the friction of moving and being compressed by tons of trash, as well as biological and chemical means such as the bacteria and corrosive chemicals present in landfills. This leads to the release of more microplastics, which can travel with leachate (the liquid that drains or "leaches" from a landfill), and eventually contaminate ground water.

Producing plastics has a much worse impact on the environment than individuals' use of them does. That's why managing plastic waste won't do much to curb the crisis. It is more important to stop the pollution at the source, which means producing a lot less single-use plastic in the first place.

What can we do? We can limit our use of plastic flatware by switching to bamboo or metal options, which require or produce significantly less energy, water, waste, and greenhouse gas emissions. Producing a pound of bamboo forks for example, expends 0.46 kilowatts of energy per hour, whereas making a pound of plastic forks expends 11 kilowatts per hour. "Compostable" flatware is another option, but remember that "compostable" tableware is not actually compostable unless it goes to a special composting facility, of which we have none in our area.



Another option (and the one I use) is to keep the plastic flatware that I unintentionally end up with and reuse it. It washes well in the dishwasher. Or just wrap up a few utensils from your kitchen drawer to keep in your car so you always have it on hand. Easy peasy!



Obviously, one person switching to reusable silverware is not going to change the global environmental impacts of plastic utensils. But as more and more people change their behavior, it becomes contagious, and can have an impact in the long run. And no matter what everyone else does, reducing the use of single-use plastic in your own life will likely lower the amount of microplastics in your own body.

## Sign and Share: Youth Open Letter to Make Polluters Pay

When the Make Polluters Pay bill—a top legislative priority of the Sacred Organizing Coalition—didn't get called for a vote out of committee last month, it effectively died for this session. But the Coalition's commitment to holding big fossil fuel companies financially accountable for their role in the climate crisis is still very much alive.

You have the opportunity to sign onto an open letter penned by the Youth Solidarity Movement, a Coalition member. The letter expresses their disappointment and calls on legislators to commit to passing Make Polluters Pay next session.
