Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon (EMO) is inviting congregations in the greater Portland/Vancouver area to join together for a visible People of Faith presence at the Portland No Kings rally and march on **Saturday, October 18**.

Given the rise in Christian nationalism that is fueling the growing autocracy of our times, it is critical that this national No Kings event has a strong, visible, and diverse interfaith presence to demonstrate disciplined nonviolent resistance.

- 10:30 am: Gather at Pioneer Courthouse Square near a purple pillar-like banner reading FAITH for a short interfaith program and service.
- 11:30 am: March together to the Battleship Memorial in Waterfront Park behind a banner reading "People of Faith: Standing Up for Compassion, Truth, and Justice."
- 12:00 pm: Large No Kings event (speakers, music, etc.) at the Battleship Memorial in Waterfront Park.
- 1:00 pm: March through streets of downtown behind vertical banner identifying People of Faith; individual communities can bring their own horizontal banners.

Agrivoltaics Advances Around the World!

Dear friends, I feel like we are all despairing in the midst of an excessive amount of bad news. Therefore, I plan to share good news articles with you more often. The following was written by Sam Matey-Coste for *The Weekly Anthropocene*, October 10, 2025.

Around the world, agrivoltaics, the practice of co-locating food production and clean energy production with photovoltaic solar panels on agricultural sites, is going from strength to strength!



The largest-yet agrivoltaic farm in Germany recently came online, with 76 MW of clean power-generating solar capacity, plus a four-crop rotation and six mobile chicken coops.



In Switzerland, an experimental agrivoltaic orchard was recently opened, growing apples, pears, and apricots amid a data-gathering sensor web below an elevated solar array!

In Brazil, a recent study found that sugarcane yields can rise thanks to agrivoltaics, with the protective solar panels interspersed with the sugarcane causing increased water retention in the soil!

China had more than 500 agrivoltaic projects in 2024, with solar panels installed over sites ranging from livestock grazing areas in Inner Mongolia to leafy vegetable-growing greenhouses on the island of Hainan to underwater sea cucumber farms in Shandong.



And in the United States, a first-ever national census of solar grazing found that in 2024 more than 113,000 sheep grazed amid solar panels on 129,000 acres of land at more than 230 sites.



A National Renewable Energy Laboratory-supported mapping project, the InSPIRE Agrivoltaics Map, now catalogs more than 600 total agrivoltaic sites in the United States!

Humanity is starting to realize that we now have the ability to set up an array of solar panels above almost any form of food production. Even better, a rising tide of research is finding that agrivoltaic projects tend to bring additional benefits everywhere they're deployed, not only providing power on the same site as farming, but even boosting food production itself. Solar panels provide shade during hot days, which directly shields what's below from UV radiation and improves water retention in the soil. That benefits everything from sheep to sugarcane!



New Monday Evening Prayer Opportunity



Join Kim Taylor-Blakemore on Mondays in the Chapel at 7:00 pm for a 30-minute contemplative prayer service featuring Lectio Divina. This simple gathering offers quiet, scripture, and space to breathe—a space to hear God’s quiet voice and rest in the breath of God’s presence.

What is Lectio Divina?

Lectio Divina (“divine reading”) is one of the earliest forms of Christian contemplative prayer. We listen slowly to a short scripture passage and move through four brief movements: reading, reflecting, responding in prayer, and resting in God’s presence. No experience is needed; come as you are. Over the program year, we will also explore various forms of contemplative prayer; we’ll begin with Lectio Divina through the end of this year.

All are welcome—whether you’re new to silence or returning to a beloved practice. We’ll gather in the Chapel on Mondays at 7:00 pm beginning **this Monday, October 20**.

Results from September Collection Drive

Thanksgiving Meals for Community Action



New Format for The Roots

Last Sunday was the first Sunday of a new experiment—The Roots (AKA “Children’s Church”) simultaneously with the worship service. After participating in the Children’s Sermon in the Sanctuary as normal, the elementary-aged (K-5) kids are invited to exit the worship service with their teacher to go have their own special class. After their lesson, they will return to their families in the Sanctuary in time to participate in communion. If you are curious about this new program, here are some brief answers to a few frequently asked questions about this change:

Why take kids out of worship? We believe offering an intentional space for kids during this portion of worship can improve the overall worship experience for both children and their parents.

What about kids outside of the K-5 age range who might want to participate? We believe it is important that we make intentional, age-appropriate space for our elementary schoolers. Younger children can always go to the nursery, while we encourage middle/high school students to participate in worship with their families.

Is there anything for elementary-aged kids after worship? As of right now, no. This program is being offered instead of The Roots during the education hour. This decision has been made in conversation with the families of our elementary-aged kids.



Welcoming New Members This Sunday!


Please join us for worship this Sunday, October 19, as we welcome and affirm new members to the St. Andrew Lutheran Church community:

Government Intrusion into a Sanctuary Congregation

On **Sunday, October 26**, the Sanctuary Team will host an adult education forum on the process to follow if there are unannounced visits to St. Andrew from federal officials seeking to detain immigrants. Amy Lomanto, director of Guidepost Montessori, will be present to share her school's recent experience.

On July 16 of this year, agents with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), masked and armed, arrested the parent of a student attending Guidepost Montessori, a preschool four miles from St. Andrew. Staff, parents, and students were unprepared – and horrified – as children were placed in “soft lockdown” and the parent, a chiropractor from Iran married to a U.S. citizen, was taken into custody.



General Guidance:

- Government officials of any type are allowed to be in public areas of the church. These include the Narthex, Sanctuary, Chapel, and Fellowship Hall only.
- Government officials cannot enter a private area without a valid signed warrant and the consent of an authorized agent of St. Andrew.
- The Lead Pastor and Parish Executive are the authorized agents of the church.
- Employees and others in the building have the right to not answer questions even if a valid warrant is presented and can ask that a lawyer be present if they are questioned. Individual employees and others should state out loud their wish to remain silent.

St. Andrew hosts a Head Start program that serves preschool children from families of all cultures and religions. We actively support a refugee family through Lutheran Community Services Northwest, provide space to Portland Taiwan Lutheran Church as well as the non-profit organization The Immigrant Story, and welcome all people into our worship space. As a Sanctuary Congregation, we are committed to providing education, advocacy, accompaniment, shelter, and safety to immigrants at risk.

Parish Executive Carol Harker has worked with the Sanctuary Team and the Church Council to define a process to follow in the event of an ICE visit. The process is summarized on small Blue Cards that the Sanctuary Team began distributing at the Ministry Fair in September. These are companions to the Know Your Rights Red Cards St. Andrew distributes in Farsi, Spanish, and Chinese.

Please join us for this important discussion on **October 26** at 11:00 am in Fellowship Hall.
