On Palm Sunday, we celebrate the story of Jesus riding into Jerusalem surrounded by peasants waving palms as an act of resistance and opposition to the oppressive Roman authorities. As people grounded in love of neighbor, we, too, stand in opposition to the oppressive systems we live within today. On **Palm Sunday, March 29**, you are invited to bring protest signs that express love, hope, and opposition to oppression (e.g. Love > Hate, Welcome the Stranger, Christians Against Christian Nationalism).

We will carry these signs along with our palm branches (which are provided) in our procession from Fellowship Hall into the sanctuary at the start of the worship service. Answer Key for Food Waste Quiz on Page 2

1: c. 50%. Which means that, right now, we could be diverting 50% of our solid waste away from landfills and use it to store carbon instead. Whoa!

2: b. Methane. Methane is a greenhouse gas that is 34 times more potent than CO₂. Many landfills have some form of methane management, but it is far more effective to divert organic waste to composting.

3: d. The process of converting organic material into stable soil carbon. The composting process requires sufficient moisture, air, and heat for soil microbes to “eat” organic material. The result is carbon sequestration as well as a valuable fertilizer.

4: d. 1,130,000,000 – 1,400,000,000 metric tons. That’s a lot of carbon!! That’s more carbon than Germany emits in two years.

5: c. All of the world’s cars. If we could completely eliminate food waste, it would be like taking every single car off of the world’s roads. How crazy is that?!

6: b. At homes, grocery stores, and restaurants. Over 80% of food waste is generated by individual consumers and the businesses that sell to them.

Palm Sunday Bread for the World Letter Writing Campaign

Advocacy for the hungry through participating in the Bread for the World letter writing campaign has been a tradition for the people of St. Andrew. This year it is more important than ever to reach out to our representatives and ask them to support legislation that will alleviate hunger in the U.S. and abroad.



Globally, almost 45 million children suffer from severe hunger, and nearly half of all preventable deaths among children under five are attributed to malnutrition. In the U.S., millions of children live in households facing food insecurity.

Child hunger is a local and a global problem, but together, we can make a difference.

Join members of the Service Committee during the education hour on **Palm Sunday, March 29**, to ask your senators and representatives to protect, restore, and secure robust funding for global nutrition programs, and to fully fund and strengthen the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC).

In preparation, consider these tips to make your letter more effective:

- Ask for a specific action, using your own words or language from the sample letter below. Give reasons for your request and make it personal.
- Share a personal reason or story that motivated you to write.
- Show St. Andrew’s commitment: “My church is helping by collecting donations for a local food pantry, but I also urge you to fully fund and strengthen these pro-family, life-affirming nutrition programs.”
- Write your name and address at the end of your letter, and on the envelope, so your members of Congress know you are one of their constituents.
- Send your letters directly to your member’s local office or DC office.

SAMPLE LETTER

Hunger is rising and children are at risk. It’s time to act.

As a person of faith, I believe every child is created in the image of God and deserving of dignity and opportunity. As your constituent, I urge you to make ending hunger a top priority.

Specifically, I ask you to:

- Restore, protect, and strengthen U.S. nutrition programs—including SNAP and WIC—that help families put food on the table;
- Fully fund and strengthen global food, health, and development programs that promote human flourishing and help keep America safe, strong, and prosperous;
- Pass a strong, bipartisan Farm Bill that supports farmers, strengthens communities, and helps end hunger at home and overseas.

Hunger is not inevitable. It’s a reflection of our priorities and policy choices. Cuts to SNAP and international assistance have already put millions at risk. We can and must do better.

In Matthew 14:16, when the disciples asked Jesus to send the hungry crowd away, he replied, “You give them something to eat.” Today, that same call comes to us. As hunger grows in our midst, we must act. I look forward to hearing how you will prioritize legislation and funding to help end hunger—for our children, our communities, and our world.

Reclaiming Christianity in the Public Square



Christians stand for loving our neighbors. We stand for healing the sick, feeding the hungry, and welcoming the stranger. We stand for telling the truth, and honoring the dignity and worth of every child of God. On **Palm Sunday, March 29**, Christians across the country will stand up to the rise of authoritarianism and white Christian nationalism. We will stand against the politics of greed, cruelty, and oppression by continuing to show the country that our central commandments – to love God and love our neighbors – are our way forward.

On the day Christians celebrate as Palm Sunday, Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey – a symbol of a just, humble leader who cares for the poor, the hungry, the sick, and the stranger – in opposition to the greed, cruelty, and oppression of the Roman Empire. Christians will follow Jesus and embody the heart of our faith on Palm Sunday 2026. We will draw a contrast to the values guiding the actions of the current administration as we embody and celebrate our love for God and love for our neighbors, regardless of where we come from or what we look like.

We proclaim a faith that centers love for our neighbors and rejects a politics rooted in greed and cruelty. To be a Christian is to choose love. Join together with other Christians at one of the Palm Sunday Faith Actions listed below. Attendees are encouraged to bring palm branches and/or protest signs with hope-filled messages (e.g. Blessed are the Peacemakers, Love > Hate, Christians Against Christian Nationalism).
